

Asian Age report makes Whatmore furious

Dav Whatmore on Wednesday came down heavily on a news item published in a foreign daily that said the Bangladesh coach had struck a deal with BBC to commentate during Bangladesh's tour of England next month.

"This are all rubbish. I am a coach not a commentator," said an irate Whatmore while talking to Daily Star Sport on telephone from the Tigers' camp in Chittagong.

The 50-year-old added that he had clarified his position to Bangladesh Cricket Board's chief executive office Macky Dudhia.

Bangladesh team sources said the coach was in a grumpy mood during the morning's training session at the Chittagong Divisional Stadium yesterday.

"He was just furious with the report. He was surprised at the idea that a professional coach could act as a commentator during a match involving his team," said a senior cricketer.

The Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) also confirmed on Wednesday that the report in Indian daily Asian Age was baseless.

"We spoke to Dav about the matter and he assured us that he never signed any such deal. However, we will not object to it if he wants to participate in post-match summaries," said BCB advisor and media committee chairman Reazuddin Al Mamun.

'I can't please everyone'

Ace Indian batsman Sachin Tendulkar on Wednesday reacted strongly to criticism that he had become a pale shadow of his former attacking self, saying his aim was to serve the team, not to please everybody.

Tendulkar, the fourth-highest scorer with 10,134 runs in 123 Tests with 34 centuries, has recently been under fire for shedding much of his flamboyance, a hallmark of his batting for long.

Critics grew in numbers especially after his 98-ball 16 in the third and final Test against Pakistan at Bangalore last month, but the 32-year-old champion said his batting style had changed with his role in the team.

He reiterated that he was enjoying his batting as much as he did when he burst on to the scene as a 16-year-old prodigy and said that he was not too concerned about public opinion regarding his craft.

"I batted with a certain style when I was 16. At 20, I batted differently. It again changed when I was 25 and again when I turned 30. With age, my role in the team changed too," Tendulkar told the Hindu newspaper.

"It's not that my batting has assumed a new character now. Please try to read my role and contribution in a team where I am the most senior player. Like others, I too think differently as I grow."

"Today, maybe Mahendra Dhoni would think and do what I did at 20."

When I was 16 I saw Kapil Dev, Dilip Vengsarkar, Ravi Shastri. They had a certain role to play, and I had my own.

"Look, I've played as I wanted to. Not to please some individuals, but to serve my team and my country. It's difficult to please all the people."

So why worry about them?

Tendulkar, who has spent an amazing 16 of his 32 years in international cricket, said he was not worried over the latest criticism as long as he was convinced he had been serving his team.

"It's a process that everyone experiences. In the past too, batsmen have made changes when compelled by certain factors like age," said Tendulkar, one Test hundred short of smashing compatriot Sunil Gavaskar's world mark of 34.

He is also the world's highest run-getter in one-day internationals with 13,642 runs in 348 matches and a record 38 centuries.

"I can't fight these changes. They are natural. It's easy for these so-called experts to talk from outside," said Tendulkar.

"And who are these people. Look at their records. Honestly, I don't think we need to even discuss them and their comments."

"I know what my job is. As long as I am convinced that I have done my job honestly, why should I lose sleep over what people have to say about my cricket?"

Tendulkar, who made his Test debut aged 16 in Pakistan in 1989, said he had now been experiencing

Tipu rejects MSC claim

A day after Mohammedan Sporting Club announced Golam Sarwar Tipu as their new coach, the former national footballer rejected the claim.

Talking to The Daily Star Sport yesterday, the ex-national coach said that he had only agreed to help the club in trouble but he was never interested to return to club coaching.

"I have a long relationship with Mohammedan and I feel it to be my duty to assist them. But I am not physically or mentally fit to take over as full-time coach. The club officials had talked with me about this, but it was inconclusive," Tipu said.

Mohammedan, in a desperate attempt to restore pride after their humiliating 5-1 loss to archrivals Abahani, replaced manager Amirul Islam Babu with Imtiaz Sultan Johnny on Tuesday and named Kazi Jashimuddin Joshi as assistant coach to Tipu. In-charge coaches Saiful Bari Titu and Mohammad Panir, who took over after the sacking of Korean coach Man Young Kang last month, have been named assistant managers.

"They are still trying to find a foreign coach and asked me to look after the team for a limited period. They are a crowd-pulling team and they had to show some activities after the big defeat. I think this is why they hurriedly named me as coach," told Tipu, adding that he would sit again with the officials after the Federation Cup.

"I am not a magician and it would be hard to motivate the players now. Joshi, who is one of my favourite students, is in charge now and if he seeks help from me, I will contribute. But I don't want to be directly involved in club coaching any more," added Tipu, who did not attend Mohammedan's yesterday's training under Joshi yesterday.
