## **DMFLC** sweat over sponsor apathy

There was high hope among the country's football bosses that the sponsors will jump at the opportunity to be part of the Dhaka Premier Division football league since it was going to be held at the crowd-pulling Bangabandhu National Stadium.

But the reality has been different. With just two weeks to go till the scheduled kick off of the most anticipated local football event, the Dhaka Metropolis Football League Committee (DMFLC) has still not managed a sponsor.

Western Union Money Transfers had sponsored the league during the last two seasons spending some 50 lakh Taka. But they were reluctant to come forward this time around. League committee secretary Mozammel Hague Mukta expressed his frustration yesterday over the issue.

"We are trying hard to get a sponsor but the reality is nobody is showing any interest. We are in talks with two companies at the moment but that is also just in the preliminary stages," said Mukta.

Sources said the companies were Tibet, the sponsors of the recently concluded Federation Cup, and GrameenPhone. The Bangladesh Football

Federation (BFF) is preferring to play a waiting game over the matter. They (league committee) have to take the initiative first and get a

sponsor. Only then we will lend a helping hand. We expected that companies would show interest with matches at the BNS. But unfortunately that is not happening," said BFF general secretary Anwarul

"We will only move for a sponsor f the league committee concedes failure." he added.

There was another issue the BFF has to resolve before the league starts with three top clubs last year's runners-up Sheikh Russel, Abahani and Mohammedan demanding an increase in the number of foreign booters.

"It is true that we have a lack of quality players in the country. That's why there is a huge gap between the teams. Foreign players could help bridge that gap. We hope to address the matter in our next meeting," said

According to this year's bylaws, a team is allowed three foreign booters at most but can field only

# Team first for Dravid

Indian vice-captain Rahul Dravid says he does not believe in running after the captaincy and would rather work in the interests of the team.

"I don't believe you need to be desperate to go out of the way to pursue it (captaincy)," Dravid told the weekly Outlook news magazine.

"That definitely does not help the team dynamics," said Dravid, who led the team in the last two onedayers against Pakistan after skipper Sourav Ganguly was slapped with a six-match ban for a slow over-

"I believe that when we are young and growing up, wanting to be cricketers, we aspire to play for India. Once we realise that ambition and establish ourselves in the team, the challenge is to perform consistently.

"Then, perhaps, the ambition of being captain comes in. This is true for everyone and I am no different, said Dravid, who has led India with reasonable success in six Tests and

The 32-year-old said he felt he



had the aggression needed to succeed at the helm over a longer period of time. "To me aggression is about

putting up a good performance under pressure, consistently, and when the team needs it the most,"

Dravid, who has scored 7,696 runs in 89 Tests and 8,134 runs in 252 one-dayers, felt outgoing coach John Wright of New Zealand had laid a solid foundation. "John has done a very good job

and set a nice platform for the next person. Hopefully, John's successor will be able to take the team to a higher level," he said.

India are looking for a new coach as Wright decided to part ways after nearly five years.

India's next assignment is in August when they travel to Sri Lanka for a tri-series also featuring the West Indies.

## Windies going slow

On an average weekday morning in Barbados the drive from Bridgetown's prestige hotel district to Kensington Oval can take 45 min-

The journey is less than seven kilometres.

Kensington Oval is scheduled to host the 2007 World Cup final, when around 20,000 cricket fans from across the globe will add to an already crippling load on the narrow, clogged and, in places, crumbling

Plans are afoot to alleviate the potential crisis, with the building of elevated freeways the latest idea put forward.

The Kensington Oval is due to be knocked down in June after Pakistan's tour of West Indies, and is due to be rebuilt, World Cup

organisers say, by the end of 2006. The ground's capacity will be more than doubled to 28,000, and

its facilities will be dramatically improved. At least, that is the blueprint,

though so far nothing has been demolished or constructed. Despite the problems, many people are confident the Caribbean

will be ready. "I do fully believe that not only will

the West Indies and Caribbean region be ready to host the next cricket World Cup, but I expect that the world would be shocked into understanding that we in the Caribbean are as special as they come when it comes to putting on a

wonderful show." Colin Croft, the

former West Indies fast bowler and

now a respected commentator, wrote in the Trinidad and Tobago "I do have my reservations about our attitudes of accelerating at the last minute to get it all done, but

despite the traumas that we have suffered. I also know that Caribbean people, individually and collectively, are tremendously resilient people. "I know that we will be ready,

spectacularly so." Others, however, are less convinced.

'They'd better get a move on," a

taxi driver said as he nudged his cab through the morning traffic during last month's third Test between West Indies and South Africa at Kensington Oval.

"We keep hearing that this or that is going to happen, that Canadian engineers are going to rebuild our road system, which is not good because a lot of the streets are built on sand.

"But it's all talk -- nothing ever seems to happen, and the time is getting short. Cricket fans hoping to find

to www.worldcupbarbados.com. the website published on official World Cup promotional material, are informed that they have reached the tuture home of a travel industry site.

When former West Indies captain Brian Lara, perhaps the most recognised person in the Caribbean, travels from his home in Trinidad to Guyana, he is required to present his passport to an immigra-

He has to pay departure tax and if he needs to change Trinidad dollars for the Guyanese variety.

That is because Guyana, which is just an hour's flight from Trinidad, is a sovereign state, as are Barbados, Antigua, Jamaica and the other seven countries where World Cup matches are scheduled to be played.

Plans to institute travel documents that will ease movement through the region are on the cards, but they remain just plans. The same goes for an as yet unseen universal Caribbean currency.

For all his enthusiasm, Croft also asked more complex questions.

"While the Caribbean and its people are passionate for the sport of cricket, will the sustainable benefits of the World Cup slip by them, especially after the tremendous investments that would have been used to bring off a successful World Cup?," he wrote

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### India turn to ex-captains to find new coach

India's cricket board included three former Test captains in a committee set up on Friday to appoint a suc-Wright, who departed as national coach last month.

The six-member panel of Sunil Gavaskar, Ravi Shastri and S Venkatraghavan plus three Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI) officials will hold their first meeting on Sunday, a board release said.

An Australian candidate is favoured to replace Wright, who ended his 4-1/2-year tenure as India's first foreign coach after the home series against Pakistan to spend time with his family. Former Australia captain Greg

Chappell and his compatriot Dean Jones have shown interest and have already forwarded their CVs to the BCCI, secretary Karunakaran Nair said.

However, a third Australian, former all-rounder Tom Moody, is seen as the front-runner.

Moody, 39, a member of the World Cup-winning squads of 1987 and 1999, is the director of cricket at English county Worcestershire and is said to have been recommended by Wright.

India's media have criticised the board for not moving quickly to find Wright's replacement

However, Nair said the BCCI had until July because India's next match is not until August when the team is due to play a one-day triseries in Sri Lanka.

Batting great Chappell was also in the race in 2000 when ex-New Zealand captain Wright was cho-Australia's Day Whatmore, who

guided Sri Lanka to the 1996 World Cup and renewed his contract with Bangladesh last month, has also shown interest in the post

West Indies paceman Pedro Collins is ready to shoulder extra responsibility in the one-day series against South Africa, which starts today in

The second ODI will also be played in Jamaica, tomorrow, followed by matches in Barbados (May 11) and Trinidad (may 14, 15).

Collins missed the second half of the Test series, which West Indies lost 2-0, because of a back problem. But he believes they can turn the tables in the one-dayers.

"I feel confident, and as the senior bowler I know it's my job to be the spearhead," said Collins, who has taken 38 wickets in 28 one-day appearances. "We've got to be spot-on and
