Man killed by cops despite his claim of innocence

The youth killed by a police patrol team on Sunday night at Agargaon in the city was shot despite his repeated claims to be innocent, the rickshaw-puller, who was carrying the victim, said yesterday.

The police on Sunday described the youth as a mugger, and said they shot him only after he and his three cohorts, challenged in an act of mugging, had hurled bombs at

The slain, Mohammad Sohel, was identified by his father Shamsul Haq Talukdar at Dhaka Medical College and Hospital yesterday.

MA Halim, an advocate who knows the rickshawpuller named Benazir, said he learnt the story when he hired his rickshaw at about 10:00pm Sunday from Ibrahimpur. Halim took Benazir to a clinic at SEE PAGE 15 COL 6

US offensive in Iraq kills 75

8 American soldiers, 4 Iraqis slain in bomb attacks

US forces have launched an offensive against insurgents in western Iraq near the Syrian border, and about 75 militants were killed in the first 24 hours while eight US servicemen and 4 Iraqis were killed in separate bomb attacks, the military

said yesterday. It said the offensive, being conducted with US air support in a desert area of Anbar province north of the Euphrates River, was targeting a sanctuary for foreign insurgents and a smuggling route

The Chicago Tribune reported Monday that more than 1,000 US troops supported by fighter jets and helicopter gunships had attacked villages in and around Obeidi, a city near the Euphrates River in western Iraq not far from the Syrian border,

Altaf blank about Paris outcome

"I had 16 meetings with different trade ministers and Bangladeshi expats in Paris and London," Altaf said, adding, his meeting with Bangladeshi Caterers Association in London was fruitful.

But international media reports hailed the Paris meet of the WTO for reaching a consensus in tariff reduction formula.

"After months of deadlock, the Doha round of global trade talks has taken a big step forward, thanks largely to an abstruse but important deal over agricultural tariffs," said The Economist on its May 5 issue.

On May 4, negotiators from the US, the European Union, Brazil, India and Australia hammered out a

formula for converting specific tariffs on agricultural goods, such as 10 cents per pound in weight, into percentage tariffs, The Economist reported

Brazilian Foreign Minister Celso Amorim told reporters on the fringe of the Paris meet they had an accord on the AVE conversion. The AVE conversion is a method for converting tariffs based on imported quantities into ad-valorem equivalents (AVE), that is, tariffs based on the

price of the product. Establishing the AVEs is a precondition for addressing the tariff reduction formula that is a central pillar of

The home ministry has recently placed a formal proposal to the establishment and finance ministries asking them to create 171 new posts in addition to the existing 557 personnel in the protection unit of the Special Branch (SB) of police.

The Ministry of Establishment has already approved creation of the 171 posts but the Ministry of

Finance approved only 95 of them, home ministry sources said.

Of the 557 existing personnel, 130 are engaged in the prime minister's security, 94 for the president, 12 in the state guest house Jamuna, six in Sudha Sadan (residence of the leader of the Opposition) and 16 on sweeping duty.

Rocca talks Nepal, Bangladesh issues with India

Flies in Dhaka tomorrow

US Assistant Secretary of State for South Asia Christina Rocca yesterday met senior Indian officials in New Delhi and discussed developments in Nepal and Bangladesh.

Rocca, who arrived in the Indian capital yesterday morning, held talks with S Jaishanker, joint secretary (America), Ranjit Rae, joint secretary (Nepal) and other officials in the external affairs ministry before leaving on a visit to Kathmandu and Dhaka, according to a report by Hindustan Times quoting the Indo-Asian News

Service (IANS). "We have for some time now developed a system of close consultations on developments in our neighbourhood and her visit was part of this process," a senior official

He noted that Rocca had stopped over in New Delhi also in April on her way to Sri Lanka to get the Indian perspective of the developments in that country, including the stalled peace process between the government and the Tamil Tiger guerrillas. "We have come to this exercise of

holding consultations whenever they visit countries in this region,' the official said. India, US and Britain have been

acting in tandem in Nepal to pressure King Gyanendra to restore democratic process in the country after the palace coup on February 1.

US Secretary of State Condoleeza Rice, during her visit to India in March, had said that just as in Nepal, Washington and New Delhi should work together in Bangladesh, where the rise of Islamic fundamentalism is matter of growing concern for
