day, the prime minister reacted sharply at her party lawmakers' irregular and poor participation that made the House suffer severe quorum crises in the past, a number of

senior BNP lawmakers said. "If you don't attend the House regularly and do your duties properly, I will be compelled to dissolve the Jatiya Sangsad and hand over power to a caretaker government for an early general election," the leader

of the House told the meeting at Jatiya Sangsad Bhaban.

She directed the deputies of her party to attach the highest priority to participation in parliamentary proceedings over all other businesses. "As lawmakers, your first and foremost duty is to participate



6 Bangladeshi peacekeepers wounded in Congo

Six United Nations (UN) peacekeepers from Bangladesh were wounded, three of them bullet-hit, when militias ambushed their motorcade in the Democratic Republic of Congo yesterday, Inter Services Public Relations (ISPR) said last

The condition of two of the injured was stated to be critical. But the identity of the Bangladeshi ambushed a mechanised peacekeepers could not immediately be known.

This was the second attack against UN peacekeepers from Bangladesh, following an ambush on February 25 that left nine Bangladeshis dead, the highest casualty of Bangladeshi soldiers in any UN peacekeeping mission.

Three peacekeepers sustained bullet injuries when rebel militias

ACC against money whitening measures in budget

The Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) will ask the government not to keep any provisions in the upcoming national budget for whitening black money, as the commission believes such provisions benefit

corrupt people. The ACC will write to Finance Minister M Saifur Rahman in this regard, cor aission sources said yesterday after a meeting that took

the decision "ACC believes there is huge black money in the country. The opportunities offered by the government to

whiten this money are encouraging corruption and discouraging genuine taxpayers," an ACC official said.

He said ACC's anticorruption drive would not succeed if the government continues to offer such opportunities that also contradict the law of the land.

By giving the corrupt people an opportunity to claim themselves to be clean, the government is actually violating the Anti-Corruption Commission Act that empowers the commission to take action against them, he observed.
