Rich-poor gap widens

The income disparity between the poor and the rich widened in six years until 2004, a new national survey has revealed, making it a case that growth does not touch every one equally.

The Poverty Monitoring Survey Report 2004 of the Bangladesh Bureau of Statistics (BBS) has further revealed that per capita income disparity between the urban poor and rich has deepened at a faster rate than in rural areas.

Inequality has broadened between the urban and rural people,

Household income comparison shows even a grimmer picture. Here, the poor's income level has dropped while the riche's increased to such an extent that the national household income increased by 10.18 percent in the six years.

HC rule on govt as HR body not formed

The High Court (HC) yesterday asked the government and the Parliament Secretariat to explain why it (government) should not be directed to form a National Human Rights Commission for protecting human rights.

The rule came after Supreme Court lawyers Abdul Momen Chowdhury, KM Zabir and Zahrul Islam filed a writ petition about the urgency of forming the commission, a key election pledge of the ruling four-party alliance.

A Division Bench of the HC asked the law secretary and secretary of the Parliament Secretariat to submit their reply in eight weeks.

The petitioners said establishment of a human rights commission is indispensable for social, economic and political rights and for administration of justice. It is needed also to prevent corruption SEE PAGE 15 COL 4

WB IMMUNITY BILL

JS body to place report with note of approval

New pay scale to get cabinet nod Monday

WB, IMF have reservations about it, says Saifur

Finance Minister M Saifur Rahman yesterday said the new pay scale for government employees will be approved in next Monday's cabinet

"Those who give us money, the IMF and the World Bank, have reservations about the pay scale," said Saifur on return from US and Turkey after an 11-day trip.

"They have told us to implement the pay scale in accordance with our capability, keeping in mind that it does not affect the inflation rate," he

Speaking to reporters at Zia International Airport, Saifur pointed out, "The government can afford the secretary committee recommendations on the new pay

The pay commission had proposed about 90 percent pay hike, but the secretary committee recommended a 60 percent increase considering the government's capacity.

Former cabinet secretary Mujibul Huq, who headed the pay

commission, however said the recommendations were made considering the government's capability and inflation.

He told BBC Bangla Service last impac night that when the government said it would not achieve desired revenue growth this fiscal year, the commission recommended implementation of the new pay scale in

About the impact of the new pay scale on inflation, he said there was already an inflationary trend. So it should be considered whether the salary needs to be increased for inflation or the increased salary

would lead to higher inflation. He suggested balancing the two sides by tightening unproductive public expenditures.

During his visit to Washington, Saifur met the new World Bank (WB) president, managing director of the International Monetary Fund (IMF), director of the USAID, and six US congressmen and senators.

Saifur requested the WB presideat to strengthen cooperation for poverty alleviation in Bangladesh.

but to make it more effective, we need good governance. Otherwise money alone cannot make any

The WB president also noted that in order to continue the democratic process, the country must come out of the politics of conflict, Saifur said

On the issue of increasing interest rates, both the WB and IMF said that the whole world is coming out

from the "low interest regime. The WB has committed \$800 million loan this year. Of this, \$300 million will be pumped in as development support credit, Health, Nutrition and Population Sector Programme will get another \$300 million and flood rehabilitation

\$200 million On the issue of the IMF's \$80 million fourth tranche of the Poverty Reduction Growth Facilities (PRGF loan that has remained suspended from January this year, Saifur said
