

Illegal 11-storey building knock-down stopped on HC stay order

Rajuk says

Rajdhani Unnayan Katripakkha (Rajuk) authorities yesterday said they could not demolish the unapproved 11-storey building in Patuatuli in Old Dhaka due to a High Court stay.

A statement signed by Md Nasiruddin, member (planning), said the Rajuk chairman had allocated Tk 4.56 lakh to knock down the building.

Rajuk sent a team comprising magistrates and police with necessary equipment to bulldoze the building on 11 May. But the team could not perform its duty due to the

Havoc at CMCH as power supply cut for 3 hours

The Chittagong Medical College and Hospital (CMCH) remained without electricity for more than three hours yesterday morning as the Power Development Board (PDB) suddenly snapped the supply, allegedly without any prior notice.

The abrupt action caught the entire CMCH administration and doctors by surprise, leading to

cancellation of scheduled operations. A stand-by electricity generator, however, kept the life-saving devices operating in the Intensive Care Unit (ICU) and carried out other emergency works.

According to sources, the PDB action, which came without any prior notice, allegedly caused the death of three patients kept in the ICU of the hospital. However, no doctors were available to confirm the allegation.

The PDB officials claimed that the hospital's electricity bills since January this year were not paid.

Health Secretary AFM Sarwar Kamal told this correspondent yesterday that all arrears due with all users under the health ministry worth Tk 22 crore up to December 2004 were paid. Following this "the

Musharraf to seek re-election in 2007

Pakistan President Pervez Musharraf will seek another five-year term as head of state after his current tenure ends in 2007, the country's Information Minister Sheikh Rashid said Tuesday.

"He will seek another term," Rashid told AFP by telephone from the eastern city of Lahore. "He will stay as president beyond 2007 because Pakistan needs his leadership."

The minister declined to comment on whether Musharraf, who is also the army chief, would retain the dual position when he seeks re-election.

Nor'wester victims in distress

Death toll 29 in 10 upazilas

Several thousand victims of Tuesday's devastating nor'wester in 10 upazilas of Natore and Rajshahi districts are in crying need of food, medicine and shelter.

The severe storm left 29 people killed, unofficial sources said yesterday. But the district administration put the death toll at 16 in Natore and

5 in Rajshahi.

The identities of nine more victims were known yesterday. They are Karim Newaz, 56, Sabuj, 12, Rubina, 18, and Golejaan of Natore Sadar upazila; Taslima of Lalpur, Razzak and Moslem of Bagmara, Amanat of Putia and Somijaan of Durgapur upazila.

Karim Newaz died of heart failure

50 rebels, 9 troops killed in Nepal

At least 50 Maoists and nine soldiers were killed in a battle in southeastern Nepal, state media reported Wednesday, in one of the latest outbreaks of heavy fighting since King Gyanendra seized power.

The battle, in which troops launched ground and air attacks, also marked the biggest reported loss of life for security forces since

the king took control February 1 in what he said was a move to end the increasingly deadly revolt.

Bodies of Maoist fighters littered the scene of Monday's clash in and around Udayapur district, 280 kilometers southeast of the capital, Kathmandu, state-run radio and newspapers said.

The clash that state media said
