

Pakistan hands over top Qaeda man to US

Key US ally Pakistan has handed over alleged top al-Qaeda operative Abu Faraj al-Libi to Washington, an official said yesterday.

Foreign Ministry spokesman Jalil Abbas Jilani confirmed a reported statement by Pakistan's military ruler President Pervez Musharraf in a Dubai newspaper on Monday that the terror network's alleged number three had been deported.

"The president made a statement to this effect. The president's statement was self-explanatory," Jilani said.

SC to hear stay appeal on polls June 11

An application seeking stay on election to 45 women's reserved seats in parliament will come up for hearing before the full bench of the Supreme Court (SC) on June 11.

Chamber Judge MM Ruhul Amin passed the order yesterday upon an application seeking leave to appeal against a High Court (HC) judgment clearing the way for holding the elections.

Police resentful of salary 'discrimination'

A deep sense of disparity has been prevailing in the police over 'salary discrimination'.

Sources said the government on Saturday stepped up security measures at all police lines across the country. Members of different intelligence agencies are keeping a close watch on both Rajarbagh and Mirpur Police Lines in the capital and other police houses elsewhere in the country.

Recently, the government has increased the salaries of police constables along with those of the sepoys of armed forces. But it caused anger among the constables as the increase in a constable's salary was less than that in a sepoys' though both are of the same grade and have to have the same educational qualifications.

Referring to the police constables' demand for elimination of 'discrepancy' between salaries of sepoys and constables, DMP Commissioner Mizanur Rahman told The Daily Star last night, "The

higher authorities have been informed of the demand and they seem quite agreeable."

A traffic constable requesting anonymity however said, "The authorities have prohibited any discussion on the issue and our movements are being watched round the clock."

The resentment started to fester on Saturday when some policemen learnt about the new salary for the armed forces sepoys.

The armed forces sepoys, police constables, and sepoys of Bangladesh Rifles (BDR) used to be paid the same salary, Tk 1625 a month.

In the new pay scale okayed by the cabinet on May 16, the salary of a police constable was increased to Tk 2,600 while an army sepoys' salary has been upped to Tk 3,150.

"What is the reason behind this discrimination when we and they have the same educational qualifications?" questioned a police constable.

"We have to be on duty for the

whole year while the army sepoys (do) only occasionally," observed the constable.

Constables at Rajarbagh Police Lines, which houses 20,000 policemen, were preparing to stage demonstration on Saturday morning against the 'discrimination'. But on intelligence information, the higher authorities ordered the police administration to quash the move.

"While we were preparing to come out of the barracks, we were instructed to get back inside and not try to get out without proper cause," another constable of Rajarbagh Police Lines told The Daily Star.

"We've been instructed to carry our ID cards even while going to bathroom," said the constable.

Besides, the same day BDR men were deployed at Rajarbagh Police Lines.

Asked about Saturday's incident, Additional Commissioner of Dhaka Metropolitan Police Faruq Ahmed said he did not know of any resentment among the policemen, and

IOJ leader, driver die in road crash

Two people, including a leader of Islami Oikya Jote (Amin), died and seven others were injured in a collision between a microbus and a covered van on the Dhaka-Chittagong highway in Burichang upazila early yesterday.

The dead are Maulana Ishaq Faridi, 55, joint secretary of the IOJ central committee and senior vice-president of Jamiatul Olama, and Mohammad Russell, 21, microbus driver.

Police said the Chittagong-bound microbus, carrying the IOJ leader and his entourage, collided head on with the covered van coming from the opposite direction at Korai at about 1:30am, killing the microbus driver on the spot and injuring Maulana Ishaq and seven others.

Ishaq succumbed to his injuries

NON-TRANSFER OF POWER LINES TO REB

WB threatens not to grant PDB Tk 500cr

In reply, the minister said about 6,000-km of electricity lines have already been transferred to the Reb, but the remaining 3,407-km of lines could not be handed over due to pending cases.

The

WB

has

signed a credit agreement deal of \$190 million under its Rural Electrification and Renewable Energy Development Project.

As per the condition of the deal, the government will have to transfer 9,407-km of electricity lines of DESA

and PDB to the Rural Electrification Board (Reb).

Under the project, the WB has already released \$85 million. It will not provide the remaining \$105 million if the government fails to transfer 3,407-km of power lines by June this year.

The delegation said the new project will cast a negative influence on providing economic support to the Siddhiganj Plant and Chittagong Power Distribution Project.

Hasina reiterates demand for early elections

The main opposition Awami League (AL) yesterday demanded immediate elections, as it believes the current parliament has become 'totally non-functional' and the government has failed miserably to deliver'.

An AL Parliamentary Party (ALPP) meeting chaired by Leader of the Opposition Sheikh Hasina yesterday reiterated the demand for early election.

Hasina, also the AL president, asked her deputies to inquire about government officials at their respective areas so that any official with bias in favour of ruling alliance cannot get appointment as a polling official, sources said.

Addressing the ALPP meeting held at the Jatiya Sangsad Bhaban, she observed that the ruling alliance might quit before its term ends as the government is losing its grip day by day. So, the party leaders better prepare for the next general election, she added.

"People just don't want to see the BNP-Jamaat-led coalition anymore in power, as it has become a burden for the country," Hasina told the newsmen after the meeting.

She said the next election would have to be held after necessary reforms in the caretaker government system and the Election Commission (EC).

The meeting decided not to join the budget session of parliament, which begins today. Besides, it discussed the party lawmakers' resigning en masse from parliament, sources said.

Backing away from its earlier stance, the AL yesterday decided not to take reserved women seats in parliament.

AL sources said the meeting discussed among other things the strife between two top leaders of Dhaka city AL, budgetary allocation against constituencies, and latest political developments in the country.

The ALPP decided to take legal
