

## HC rule on govt over cancellation of relief for Biharis

The High Court yesterday issued a rule upon the government to show cause as to why cancellation of allotment of relief to the Stranded Pakistanis, known as Biharis, in Bangladesh should not be declared illegal.

After hearing a writ petition filed by three Stranded Pakistanis - Sadak Khan, Mustaque Ahmed and Shahed Ali Babu - challenging the validity of a government order, on January 27, 2004, cancelling relief allotment for the Stranded Pakistanis, the High Court passed the order.

The rule made by a High Court bench comprising Justice MA Matin and Justice Mamnoon Rahman is returnable within two weeks.

In the petition, they submitted that the International Red Cross Society provided relief to the Stranded Pakistanis in Bangladesh from 1972 to 1976. The then Bangladesh government took the responsibility of supplying relief to

**JU URP students demand removal of chairman**

The students of urban and regional planning (URP) department of Jahangirnagar University (JU) submitted a memorandum to the vice-chancellor on Sunday urging him to implement their two-point demand.

The demands included publishing of all results under amended grading system, and immediate removal of the chairman of the department.

The amended grading system was introduced in 2001 bringing some changes to the old grading system.

A student having 75 out of 100 could be awarded 'A' grade, according to amended grading system, while it required 90 under the old grading system, said the students while explaining the reason for their demand.

The other demand included the removal of Shazed Ashraf Karim who did not take any action against a junior teacher who assaulted a senior teacher of the department before the students and the chairman over some trivial issues.

The students also urged the university authorities to take immediate initiatives to help reduce session jam that has already crippled all academic activities.

**1,757 more held**

## Cabinet okays draft of Electricity (Amend) Act

The Cabinet yesterday approved a draft law to prevent illegal use and pilferage of electricity as well as ensure proper use of power.

The council of ministers at its regular weekly meeting endorsed the draft of the Electricity (Amendment) Act 2005 that contains a strict provision for preventing the theft of power, which contributes to staggering system loss in power distribution.

The cabinet also approved the

draft of the Negotiable Instruments (Amendment) Act 2005 that provides for settlement of assets and liabilities.

Prime Minister Khaleda Zia presided over the meeting at the Prime Minister's Office.

Cabinet members and state ministers in charge of different ministries attended the meeting. Cabinet Secretary, Principal Secretary to the PM and secretaries of different ministries were present.
