Bashar's toss fear

Habibul Bashar is by far the most successful Bangladesh captain with seven wins in the last 15 months under his belt and the triumph against Australia at Sophia Gardens in Cardiff in the NatWest Series is the brightest iewel in his

But the 32-year-old felt that the luck factor has done little in his success story since he took over from Khaled Mahmud.

Take for instance the last five tosses he was involved in -- four with England captain Michael Vaughan including the two-Test series and the other one against Australian captain Ricky Ponting. He lost all of them.

"I feel more pressure when I walk into the middle for the toss than batting out there. I have already lost five out of five and most likely lose the last three and create a record of some sort," said a witty Bashar with a boyish smile on his face after the net session at Old

Trafford. "Although I have lost the tosses in the last two one-dayers, it eventually fulfilled my wish," said the

Ponting surprised everybody by electing to bat at Sophia Gardens. where the team batted first in the last four games ended up a loser.

"We also had a plan to bowl first at Trent Bridge against England and I'm relieved that I called the coin correctly. The information we gathered is that at Trent Bridge the ball does a bit in the first hour. But we bowled badly in the first 15

overs," Bashar said. England went to score 391-5, the second biggest innings total in one-day history, but Mohammad Ashraful with a blazing 94 saved the blushes of the visitors.

Bashar however disagreed that the 168-run defeat against England at Trent Bridge was a blow to the morale of the team after the famous five-wicket win against Australia.

"Everyone in the team looks very positive. We might have lost against England by a big margin but we could have easily posted a big total against them after Ashraful was out n the 26th over," he said.

Bashar's men enjoyed a twohour training under brilliant sunshine at Old Trafford, which is the home of English county Lancashire and where great left-arm paceman Wasim Akram played for more then ten years.

Bangladesh coach Dav Whatmore also enjoyed a brief stint with them after his days with Sri Lanka were over.

"Whatmore coached the Lancashire team here before joining Bangladesh. So, his experience will be a great help for us before the next game against Australia," said

But the Bangladesh captain said that he was not thinking about repeating the same feat against the Australians.

"Our target is to play positive cricket no matter we win or lose. We have beaten Australia but at the same time we also know that victory will not come quite often for us. What we can to do is play positive and fight till the end," Bashar said.

The number of Bangladeshi expatriates in Manchester, the third most important commercial city in England after London and Birmingham, is quite noticeable, They are very excited at the prospect of watching a good contest in the city that has produced England's most recognisable footballer David Beckham and allrounder Andrew Flintoff.

Muktijoddha survive Russel onslaught

Sheikh Russel Krira Chakra strikers wasted sion Football League half a dozen sitters to let Muktijoddha Sangsad off the hook in yesterday's incident packed Premier Football League match at the Bangabandhu National

In an embarrassingly one-sided affair, last year's runners-up Russel -- who reportedly put behind their internal politics that disrupted their performance earlier in the league -displayed a lively brand of football but had to remain satisfied with one point from the goalless draw.

After six matches, Russel stayed sixth in the ten-team table with eight points while Muktijoddha shared the second place with Brothers Union

Muktijoddha, who came to the sixth round clash with high hopes of taking lead in the table with a victory. did not threaten to score even for once before or after Hassan Al Mamun's sending-off decision in the 34th minute

The national defender received his marching orders after he assaulted referee Tayab Hassan who had just shown Nigerian forward Paul Nwakwuchu a yellow card. Paul was fortunate to receive only a caution instead of a red card after retaliating against rival defender Jahirul, kicking the Russel player in his face after a mid-pitch

Down to ten men, the Reds opted to do what they are infamous for -defending doggedly despite having three foreigners and six national stars.

Russel could have gone ahead six minutes after start but Moroccan striker Majid mistimed a kick inside from the six-yard box after Tanvir did the spadework on the left wing. The skinny Moroccan then forced rival captain and national number one custodian Aminul to make two spectacular saves inside a minute.

First, Aminul went full-stretch to his right to keep out Majid's header on a long ball by Sharif in the 18th

minute before pulling off an absolute blinder from the line with one hand when Majid nodded Tanvir's cross

Eyeing their third win, Russel began the second half with a relentless assault but a diving Aminul denied Tanvir's powerful shot in the 53rd minute. Two minutes later, Majid placed his shot from two yards over the bar and a hapless Aminul.

midway through the second half when Majid toe-poked a long ball by Maruf over Aminul's head but saw the drop-shot kiss the crossbar before going out. There was no respite and Majid provided his compatriot Rachid with the easiest chance but the striker drove the ball straight to Aminul in the 70th minute.

Brazil in semis the hard way

World champions Brazil thwarted a late Japan fightback to claim a nailbiting 2-2 draw on Wednesday and line up a Confederations Cup semifinal against Germany.

Brazil, leading 2-1 with goals from Robinho and Ronaldinho, were stunned when Masashi Oguro fired home a rebound with two minutes to go after Shunsuke Nakamura's free

Japan roared forward and Marcos had to make a point-blank save from Oguro in injury-time to secure the draw Brazil needed to claim second place in Group B on goal difference, earning the semifinal against the hosts in Nuremberg on Saturday.

Group B winners Mexico will face Argentina in the second semi-final in Hanover on Sunday.

Japan, coached by former Brazil midfielder Zico and playing a style of football in keeping with his legacy, were fearless, even as the world champions attacked with pace and guile in the first half.

Rugby boss seeks Whatmore's help

lan Millward is ready to call on Bangladesh cricket coach Dav Whatmore to inspire Wigan to a shock win in Sunday's Powergen Challenge Cup rugby quarterfinal at

Warriors boss Millward returns to Knowsley Road for the first time since being sacked by holders Saints last month for gross miscon-

But Wigan have lost three of their four matches in his charge and were thrashed 70-0 at Leeds on Saturday -- the club's heaviest-ever defeat.

Millward, who led Saints to Challenge Cup final glory over Wigan last season, admitted: "I rate St Helens a better side than Leeds and we will be huge underdogs.

Wigan will still be without injured Sean O'Loughlin, Gaz Hock, Danny Orr, David Vaealiki and Kris Radlinski although Brett Dallas is set to return after hamstring trouble.

Kiwi prop Jerry Seuseu has been cleared to play for Wigan after avoiding a ban despite being found ilty of an off-the-ball challenge on Jamie Jones-Buchanan in Saturday's defeat at Leeds.

New Zealand ban Zimbabwe cricketers

New Zealand may ban a planned tour by the Zimbabwe cricket team scheduled for December because of "appalling abuses of human rights" under President Robert Mugabe's government, Foreign Minister Phil Goff said Thursday.

"The Zimbabwe cricket team should not anticipate that it will be granted entry into New Zealand.' Goff said in a statement.

"The imposition of a ban on the team would send a strong message to the Mugabe regime that New Zealanders and their government abhor the actions it is taking against its people.

Mugabe's government has been pulling down thousands of homes and businesses, leaving hundreds of thousands homeless in winter, according to the United Nations. The destruction targeting mostly poor areas has been condemned worlwide and follows March elections described as a sham by for-


