

Reds smell a rat Mukti v BU today

Trouble-torn Mukti Jiddha Sangsad Krira Chakra promised to give a fitting reply when they take on defending champions Brothers Union in a crucial Premier Football League match today at 5 pm at the Bangabandhu National Stadium.

After a four-match ban on the Bangladesh mid-fielder Hasan Al Mamun and one match suspension on Nigerian striker Ernest Jeremiah, the Reds arranged a press conference yesterday to explain the situation.

Without mentioning names Mukti Jiddha coach Shafiqul Islam Manik said that some big clubs were conspiring against them but they were ready to face the challenge on the field rather than carry out their threatened boycott of the league.

"Both Ramkrishna Gosh and Tayab Hasan are undoubtedly two of the best referees in the country but I think even they have been influenced by some quarters. Also we have video evidence to prove how these officials took some controversial decisions in our last match," informed Manik.

Later, the footage involving two incidents during their match against Mohammedan, which they lost by solitary goal, was screened in the briefing.

Manik, however, said that Hasan Al Mamun, who also attended the briefing, regretted his unruly behaviour against Gosh but believed the punishment, meted out against him and Jeremiah was unfair.

While Manik was blazing away off the field, his Brothers' counterpart Wajed Gazi chose to be concerned about his boys' on-field performances, in particular Russian striker Edwards for his lacklustre displays.

Shahriar the left solution

A nightmare visited Bangladesh exactly a week after their dream come true win against Australia when they crashed to a ten-wicket defeat against the world champions at Old Trafford on Saturday.

Eight wickets fell for 26 runs with the last five perishing for the just two runs being added to the total and that too after a third-wicket stand of 90 runs between Shahriar Nafees and Mohammad Ashraful.

The collapse was as surprising as Bangladesh's five-wicket triumph against the same side at Cardiff on June 18.

People, however, said that the only highlight for Bangladesh at Old Trafford was Ashraful's 58. Ashraful is certainly the man in form and has been the topic of discussion for what he has done in his last three innings.

But young left-hander Shahriar Nafees deserved a little bit of attention for his fluent 47 in only his second ODI appearance. His flawless 57-ball knock featured six sweetly-timed hits across the rope.

But more importantly he never looked uncomfortable in his second game after a nervous debut against England at Trent Bridge where he scored just 10.

"When I came out to bat with Javed (Omar) bhai it was not an ideal condition because the sky was cloudy and the two opening bowlers bowled very well.

"Since I have not been among the runs I tried to play cautiously and grew in confidence hitting the ball very well," said Shahriar after the match at Old Trafford.

"I did not play my natural game. It was not even required because we were getting five runs in every over. With Ashraful batting at the other end and we were rotating the strike freely we were looking for a big bag," said 19-year-old.

"I tried to occupy the crease as long as possible because I knew the longer I stay the more I would learn.

But I felt very bad when I got out at a very important stage of the game," recalled Shahriar, who was bowled by Andrew Symonds.

He might have got out for 11 in his third game against England at Headingley on Sunday, but the

ODI rule changes go on trial from July 30

The International Cricket Council (ICC) announced it would be introducing major rule changes into one-day international matches on a 10-month trial basis starting on July 30.

The major alterations, which were approved Saturday at a meeting of the global governing body's chief executives' committee (CEC) at the ICC's headquarters at London's Lord's Cricket Ground, involve an extension of the current 15 overs fielding restrictions and the introduction of replacement players.

Under the new rules there will be an increase from 15 to 20 overs of restrictions where teams are only allowed two players outside the 30-yard 'circle'.

Unlike the present system, where the fielding restrictions are only in place for the first 15 overs, the new set-up means they will apply for the first 10 overs of every innings plus two additional blocks of five overs which must be selected by the fielding captain.

The CEC decided that the additional 'close-catcher' field restrictions, where two stationary players must be within the 15-yard 'inner circle', should only apply for the first 10 overs.

The CEC also approved the introduction of soccer-style replacements which will permit sides to

replace a player at any stage of a match.

The replaced player will be ruled out of the rest of the match while the replacement will be entitled to assume any remaining batting or bowling duties. Both players will receive a cap.

Currently substitutes in all forms of cricket are generally only permitted to field.

These two innovations may be trialled during the NatWest Challenge between England and Australia starting on July 7 at Headingley.

However, the England and Wales Cricket Board and Cricket Australia will both need to give their consent before the new rules can be introduced in the three-game series.

The changes will be reviewed by the ICC's cricket committee, chaired by former India batsman Sunil Gavaskar - which made the initial recommendations at its 2006 meeting.

As well as the one-day changes, a proposal to undertake a technology trial during the Super Series in Australia in October was also approved.

This will allow on-field umpires to consult with the TV umpire on any aspect of any decision with the final decision remaining with the on-field umpire.

The only exceptions to this will be line decisions, which will be dealt with by the TV umpire in the same manner as at present, and clean

catches, where the existing process will also be retained.

Meanwhile the ICC also announced the establishment of an expert panel to work with the game's lawmakers, the Marylebone Cricket Club (MCC), and manufacturers to review the rules governing cricket bats.

Concerns have been expressed that some leading players' bats exceed the permitted width of four-and-a-quarter inches and that, following a banned practice in baseball, some bats have been injected with cork in a bid to increase their power.

Law Six, the rule relating to bats, currently states that "the blade of the bat shall be made solely of wood."

In particular, the CEC considered the specific case of the controversial Kookaburra bat used by several international players, including Australia captain Ricky Ponting.

These have a thin film of graphite running down the back in a bid to strengthen the blade.

The CEC did not make a definitive judgement but agreed that the bats should be allowed pending a final decision from MCC on their legality in relation to current regulations.

Abahani prevail in goal-feast

All-rounder Adriano

Brazil marksman Adriano turned in a scintillating two-goal display to send the five-time World Cup

winners into the final of the Confederations Cup with a 3-2 win over hosts Germany here on Saturday.

The Inter Milan striker set up all of Brazil's goals, winning a penalty for Ronaldinho to convert, and scoring two himself after Germany had twice equalised through Lukas Podolski and a Michael Ballack penalty.

It was the third time Brazil have reached the final and they will hope to repeat their win from 1997 in the Frankfurt final in four days' time.

Argentina or Mexico will be their opponents with the two facing off on Sunday in the other semi-final.

Brazil coach Carlos Alberto Parreira paid tribute to his players' resilience against a German side which gave its all.

"My players were tired, but this was a mental game far more than a technical game," Parreira said. "They showed a lot of confidence and a lot of courage and that is why I am proud of my team."

"It is not easy to beat Germany here, on their home ground, in what was a World Cup final for them."

For Germany it was a disappointing
