Tengratila flames leap to 400 feet

Situation worsens as fire spreads further

Situation at the Tengratila gas field in the remote area under Doarabazar of Sunamganj district has deteriorated up to the roaring fire went up to 400 feet yesterday.

Besides, the fire spread to at least 5 to 6 new points each with 20 to 30 feet height around the burning well.

Repeated jolts were experienced in three kilometre area around the gas field Sunday night and yesterday, locals said.

Leakage of gas bubbles continued in the marshy lands two kilo-metres around the gas field.

Meanwhile, Niko has finalised the decision to employ the US driller Century for drilling the proposed relief well at Tengratila gas field, Niko sub-contracted US company Parker for drilling the relief well there.

Parker's rig also got badly damaged in Friday's blowout.

It is not possible to start work there just now and they have to wait until the fire subsides considerably, a Niko official said.

It will take at least 6 to 8 weeks for Century to get free for starting pre-

paratory work in Tengratila, the Niko official preferring anonymity said.

After the January 7 blowout and explosion destroyed the rig used by a Chinese company that was engaged by Niko at Tengratila gas field, Niko sub-contracted US company Parker

for drilling the relief well there.

Parker's rig also got badly damaged in Friday's blowout.

It is not possible to start work there just now and they have to wait until the fire subsides considerably, a Niko official said.

Niko unable to plug gas well before Dec

Experts fear, demand punishment to the 'incompetent' company

Gas experts yesterday observed that incompetent Canadian oil company Niko Resources is unlikely to be able to seal before December the Tengratila gas well that exploded for the second time on Friday.

The fire at the gas field is most likely to continue for a maximum of two months, damaging millions of dollars worth of national resources and the environment of Sunamganj area, one of them noted.

Niko is unlikely to be able to control the fire unless nature itself takes care of the problem, he pointed out.

But the experts say they don't see any possibility of Niko quickly

"Niko is absolutely a novice and an incompetent company whose repeated negligence is costing the country its resources and environment. But a section of policymakers are protecting this company and punishing Bapex instead. Bapex has absolutely no role in the blowout. Niko is the operator and it should be punished first," he added.

The company officially says it will submit its plan of action within a week and upon its approval within two weeks, it will start its operation to tame the fire.

But the experts say they don't see any possibility of Niko quickly

376 industries
keep polluting
environment
for 8 years

No fewer than 376 industrial units continue to severely pollute the environment and have not implemented the environmental management action plan despite a government directive almost eight years ago.

Environment and Forest Minister Tarique Islam informed parliament yesterday that in 1997

the Directorate of Environment identified as many as 1,176 industries responsible for severe environmental pollution in the country. It had asked them to implement the plan and establish effluent treatment plant.

Top US lawmakers for free int'l probe

A group of US senators and congressmen have asked the United States Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice to propose a resolution in the United Nations Security Council calling for an independent international investigation into the killing of Bangladeshi Society.

"It is important that this investigation restores public confidence in the justice system, and that is viewed as valid and legitimate by wide and diverse segments of Bangladeshi Society. A delegation of international observers could advance this goal," the letter says.

"We recognize and appreciate that the Government of Bangladesh has arrested eight individuals and is seeking justice in the Kibria assassination case. We urge you to do all you can to see that the investigation is conducted in a fair, expedient and transparent manner and meets

international standards," four US senators and eight congressmen said in a letter addressed to Rice on June 23.

"It is important that this investigation restores public confidence in the justice system, and that is viewed as valid and legitimate by wide and diverse segments of Bangladeshi Society. A delegation of international observers could advance this goal," the letter says.

"If the investigation does not bring to justice the perpetrators of Mr. Kibria's murder, including those who organized and ordered the attack and any who may have worked to protect the perpetrators, then we urge you to propose a

A pall of gloom descended on relatives and admirers who gathered at the Zia International Airport early yesterday morning to receive the body of Dr Sitara Parvin, a professor of journalism at Dhaka University.

Prof Sitara, 52, was killed in a tragic road crash in the US on Friday, and her body was flown in to Dhaka by a Biman Bangladeshi Airlines flight at 3:40am.

Her father former president Justice Shahabuddin Ahmed along with other family members including Sitara's husband Abduzzaman Mohammad Ali and daughter Esha Sabontee received the body at the airport.
