Real have a fight on hand

Real Madrid's move to sign Brazil striker Robinho is in danger of falling apart, according to one of the player's representatives

Robinho's long-awaited move from Santos to Real Madrid appeared to be on the cards last week, with even the player claiming the switch could be completed in a matter of hours.

However Juan Figer, who owns 40% of Robinho's rights, has warned that Santos, who own the remaining 60%, could hold out for more money than the 17 million euros (\$A26.9million) offered by Madrid.

Figer said: "At the time I said that Madrid should have closed the deal and not just assured themselves an option on the player and now it is going to cost them a lot more time and effort to sign him.

"Although they only have 60% of his rights, Santos are calm. He has a buy-out clause of 50million dollars (\$64.2million) and a contract until the end of June 2008.

Figer also claims that Madrid are not the only club interested in the 21year-old, while adding that there is a popular campaign in Brazil to stop the youngster playing his football abroad next season.

"He is a player very much in demand and his price has gone up in recent weeks," Figer said.

"It is true that Arsenal are interested, but it's not a question of it being a race. The fact is that Real Madrid have an advantage.

"There is an agreement between Real Madrid and Robinho, but he has a contract with Santos and he has become a state matter in Brazil."

"He is the best player in the Brazilian league and nobody wants to see him leave the country, not even the president." Source

nounced dead in hospital. "The aim is to identify problems in advance, using special sportscardiological diagnostics," said FIFA medical co-ordinator Professor Toni Graf-Baumann of Germany.

There have been an alarming number of similar cases recently including those of Hungary international Miklos Feher of Benfica, who died after collapsing from a heart attack in January 2004, and Sae Caetano defender Serginho, who died in a Brazilian championship match in October the same year.

Hugo Cunha, a midfielder with Portuguese club Uniao Leiria, collapsed and died during a game with friends on Saturday, according to a report by Lusa news agency.

FIFA dedicated Sunday's Confederations Cup semi-final between Mexico and Argentina to the memory of Foe.

World soccer's governing body said they had been giving seminars on cardiac testing and prevention since 2000, after a number of lower profile cases of sudden cardiac arrest in footballers.

Argentina's players wore black armbands during the match in memory of teenage Independiente goalkeeper Emiliano Molina, a member of his country's under-17 team this year who died on Saturday in Buenos Aires from serious iniuries suffered in a car crash 12 days earlier.

Pekerman has used the Confed Cup to hand valuable international experience to players like goalkeeper German Lux, who set up Argentina's win when he saved Mexico's sixth penalty taken by Ricardo Osorio.

"Saving that penalty represents an important stage in his career," said Pekerman.
