## Need tickets for final?

Around 2,000 tickets are still available for Wednesday's Confederations Cup final in Frankfurt, organisers reported.

Saturday's semi-final between Germany and Brazil was a sell-out in Nuremberg, but over 3,000 seats have yet to be snapped up for Sunday's semi between Argentina and Mexico. Organisers say the two-week, 16-match event has been a success with the fans, with 500,000 of the 620,000 total tickets available having been sold.

# Celebrate football

Brazil expect Adriano to recover in time for Wednesday's Confederations Cup final against Argentina when one of the fiercest rivalries in world soccer resumes on unfamiliar territory.

Adriano, who scored twice in Brazil's 3-2 semi-final win over hosts Germany on Saturday, limped out of Monday's training with an ankle injury but the team doctor said he should be fit.

Brazil, the five times World Cup winners, and Argentina, twice former world champions, will be playing their 40th competitive match -- and their fourth in Europe.

Argentina should be clear favourites after beating Brazil 3-1 in a World Cup qualifier as recently as June 8 but Brazil beat Argentina a year ago to win the Copa America, albeit with a penalty shoot-out victory in the final.

If Brazil win on Wednesday they will become only the second country

after France to hold three senior FIFA titles at the same time: the World Cup, their continental crown and the Confederations Cup. France achieved that feat in 2001.

Both sides nevertheless, will have a lot more at stake than who wins the Confederations Cup on Wednesday.

With five World Cup victories to two, Brazil appear to be the better team historically. According to FIFA records, however, Argentina are the only nation in the world to hold a lead over Brazil in head-to-heads -- 34-33 with 22 ties.

But the countries have been squabbling for years about who has the lead. World Cup holder Brazil contend that it is 34-34, while Argentina believe they lead their great rival by two victories.

Neither team's records, however, agree with FIFA's.

Whoever leads, there is the chance of a classic final at Frankfurt's Waldstadion, provided both teams overcome the weariness that comes with playing five games in two weeks.

"The fact we are playing Brazil

wipes out any kind of fatigue," Argentina captain Juan Pablo Sorin said. "In reality, they are better, but we have determination, heart and desire. Brazil are always an extra motivator."

"There is nothing better than playing the final against a classic rival."

But the Brazilians also were optimistic.

"A final is a great source of motivation," Barcelona forward Ronaldinho said. "It will be a great game against a great team."

"We want to end the season on a high note, with a title. You forget you're tired when it's a final. It's the last game, and we'll shrug off our tiredness."

Coach Carlos Alberto Parreira believes the two finalists have the best individual stars in world soccer.

"It's going to be a fantastic final," he said. "It's a meeting between two excellent schools of soccer. It will be a duel between two great teams of world soccer -- teams which probably have the best individual players."

Jose Pekerman's Argentina looked exhausted as they beat Mexico 6-5 on penalties in the second semi-final in Hanover on Sunday, after a gruelling match ended 1-1 after extra time.

Brazil had enjoyed a relatively straightforward win over Germany 24 hours earlier in Nuremberg and the mauling they received in that last meeting in Argentina will be a powerful incentive.

Parreira will be keen to prove that his ultra-attacking formation can be effective against top class opposition.

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# The decisive quartet

Four players who could decide whether Brazil or Argentina win the Confederations Cup final here on Wednesday:

**LUCIANO FIGUEROA (ARGENTINA):** The blond striker has notched four goals, making him the tournament's joint top scorer with Australia's John Aloisi. He came to Germany seeking to win a first-team spot for next year's World Cup finals and may have done enough to prove he is the natural successor to Hernan Crespo in the Argentine frontline. Lightning quick, the 24-year-old is the ideal recipient for Juan Roman Riquelme's passes from midfield. A brief and unhappy period at English Premiership club Birmingham City seems a long way behind him now and, with Riquelme and defender Juan Pablo Sorin, he is part of a trio of Argentine players who are set to take next season's Champions League by storm with unfashionable Spanish club Villarreal.

**ADRIANO (BRAZIL):** The burly forward out-muscled Germany to score twice and win a penalty in the 3-2 victory in the semi-finals. Adriano combines physical strength with skills rarely found in such a big man. After a stunning long-range goal in the opener against Greece, he was shackled by the defences of Mexico and Japan. But his confidence never dipped and he beat the Germans virtually single-handedly. "He has had his ups and downs over the past three years but I never lost faith in him," said Brazil coach Carlos Alberto Parreira. The only negative point for the left-footed player from Inter Milan is that he has not had a chance to form a partnership with the absent Ronaldo. But expect him to be back in Germany for next year's World Cup finals.

**JUAN ROMAN RIQUELME (ARGENTINA):** The midfield general of his team who has looked at times like a player at the top of his game. He has made a mockery of the prediction of former national coach Marcelo Bielsa who said he would never make the grade at international level. His precision free kicks are reminiscent of David Beckham at his best and his passes can prise open a tight game. Brazil coach Carlos Alberto Parreira said Riquelme was one of the opponents

his team feared the most. "Riquelme is a player who will decide the match if we give him the space. He is a great player and I think he is currently the best Argentine footballer," Parreira said. The 27-year-old

shrugs off comparisons with Diego Maradona but should be one of the stars to watch at the World Cup.

**RONALDINHO (BRAZIL):** The World Footballer of the Year said he was tired before the tournament and has looked it at times, especially when caught in Mexico's defensive straitjacket. Yet even when not at 100 percent, the Barcelona superstar remains the beat at the heart of Brazil - both on the pitch and in the team's hotels where he signals the team's arrival on a drum. Ronaldinho has seemed happy at this tournament to take a back seat to the new star of Brazilian football, Robinho, but in a game in which the traditional South American pride at stake is just as important as the trophy, he has all the attributes to conjure up the match-winning goal.

## KEY BRAZIL V ARGENTINA MATCHES SINCE 1974

A look at some key matches between arch-rivals Brazil and Argentina since they first met in Europe in the World Cup finals in West Germany in 1974:

In all they have met 88 times, with 33 wins each in a rich footballing rivalry dating back to 1914.

Wednesday's Confederations Cup final in Frankfurt will be their fourth meeting in Europe after three memorable World Cup encounters in 1974, 1982 and 1990:

**June 30, 1974 - HANOVER, West Germany: BRAZIL 2 ARGENTINA 1**

Their first ever meeting outside of South America ended with Brazil winning 2-1 in a second round group match in the World Cup finals.

Brazil, the holders, took the lead with a left-foot thunderbolt from Rivelino from outside the box.

Midfielder Miguel Angel Brindisi equalised with a fine free kick that beat Leao and went in off the cross-

bar in the 35th minute for an Argentine side that included a young Mario Kempes.

Jaizinho, like Rivelino a member of the great Brazilian side that won the title in 1970, struck the winner also from outside the box to send Brazil into a group decider, effectively a semi-final, with Johan Cruyff's Dutch total-football masters.

**July 2, 1982 - BARCELONA, Spain: BRAZIL 3 ARGENTINA 1** Another fine Brazilian side ended Argentina's reign as world champions with a 3-1 victory in their World Cup second round group match at the compact Sarria stadium. It was 1978 title winning coach Cesar Luis Menotti's last match in charge.

Inspired by the great midfielders Falcao and Socrates, the Brazilians raced into a 3-0 lead with goals from Zico, Serginho and Junior.

A frustrated 21-year-old Diego Maradona, reacting to a foul on fellow midfielder Juan Barbas, kicked an opponent and was sent off in the 85th minute.

Striker Ramon Diaz scored a consolation goal for Argentina four minutes later and Brazil went on to a decider with Italy, which they lost 3-2.

**24 June, 1990 - TURIN, Italy: ARGENTINA 1 BRAZIL 0**

Brazil were all over another Argentina side defending the World Cup who, having been upset 1-0 by Cameroon in the tournament's opening game, had scraped into the second round knockout match as a third-placed team from the group stage. But the Brazilians failed to convert their chances and Diego Maradona, hobbling on one good ankle, put Claudio Caniggia away with a sublime pass for the only goal 10 minutes from time.

The match was in the news again recently because of the controversy of Brazil defender Branco allegedly drinking contaminated water from a bottle handed to him by the

Argentine bench.

Sebastiao Lazaroni's side went home unexpectedly early for a Brazilian team while Maradona managed to inspire his troops all the way to a second successive final in Rome which they lost to West Germany.

There is parity in the five meetings so far this century with four World Cup qualifiers -- two for the 2002 finals in Asia and two for next year's tournament in Germany -- going to the home team.

Only penalties separated the teams in their other meeting so far this century when Brazil won the 2004 Copa America final in Lima in a shootout after a 2-2 draw.

**July 26, 2000 - SAO PAULO: BRAZIL 3 ARGENTINA 1**

Midfielder Vampeta scored twice as Brazil won 3-1 in the first ever World Cup qualifier between the teams at Sao Paulo's Morumbi stadium.

# Final thoughts in Dhaka

For a day the Premier Division Football League took a backseat yesterday at the Bangabandhu National Stadium.

On an overcast Tuesday afternoon local stars put aside their egos and opinions about the title race and instead all they wanted to talk about was first-ever showdown of the two most passionately supported teams in Bangladesh in a FIFA Confederations Cup final.

The Brazil and Argentina clash in Frankfurt on Wednesday 'the topic' and understandably loyalties were divided ahead of the mother of all matches.

Country's mercurial marksman Alfaz Ahmed couldn't recall when he last missed a football match involving one of the two South American heavyweights and when it comes to a Brazil-Argentina battle he just forgets everything.

"It's just impossible for a football lover to keep away from the heat. I always love to see these fierce rivals lock horns and I've told my teammates that they could learn a lot of things from just one match," said the Mohammedan striker, who is now nursing an injury.

"Many call me a crazy Argentina supporter but I don't mind. I believe Argentina has a realistic chance to win especially as they have a better defence than the Brazilians. But I will miss Javier Saviola (who picked up a red card against Mexico in the semifinal)," said Alfaz adding that Luciano Figueroa had the ability to make the difference.

Brothers Union midfielder Monwar Hossain described how the rest of his mates were enjoying the Confederations Cup matches at the Gopibagh club, in particular the dramatic semifinals.

"All the players are going be glued to the set tomorrow night. And in fact most have hedged bets. I'm a great admirer of Brazil and at the moment Robinho is my pick for his amazing ball skills," said the Bangladesh medio.

His senior clubmate Jewel Rana, the former Bangladesh captain, said the new generation of Bangladeshi footballers were more knowledgeable and enthusiastic followers of

the international game.

"Although the standard of the domestic game has been falling, there is no shortage of interest in the younger generation about international soccer. They are more into it than we ever were. Definitely there will be a lot of noise at the club house come Wednesday," said Jewel.

Jewel was also keeping his fingers crossed in anticipation of Brazil taking revenge for their embarrassing defeat in a recent World Cup qualifier against the bitter rivals.

"It is always a treat to see Brazil's

attacking quartet of Adriano, Kaka, Robinho and Ronaldinho in action together. I think the match is especially significant for both teams' supporters after last month's World Cup qualifier," said the veteran footballer.

Country's number one goalkeeper Aminul Haque was still haunted by his gaffes in Mukti-joddha's 3-1 defeat against Brothers Union on Monday. All he was hoping for was a victory for the samba brigade so that he could sleep a little easy.

"No footballer wants to miss this match. I just pray Brazil wins tomorrow," said Aminul.

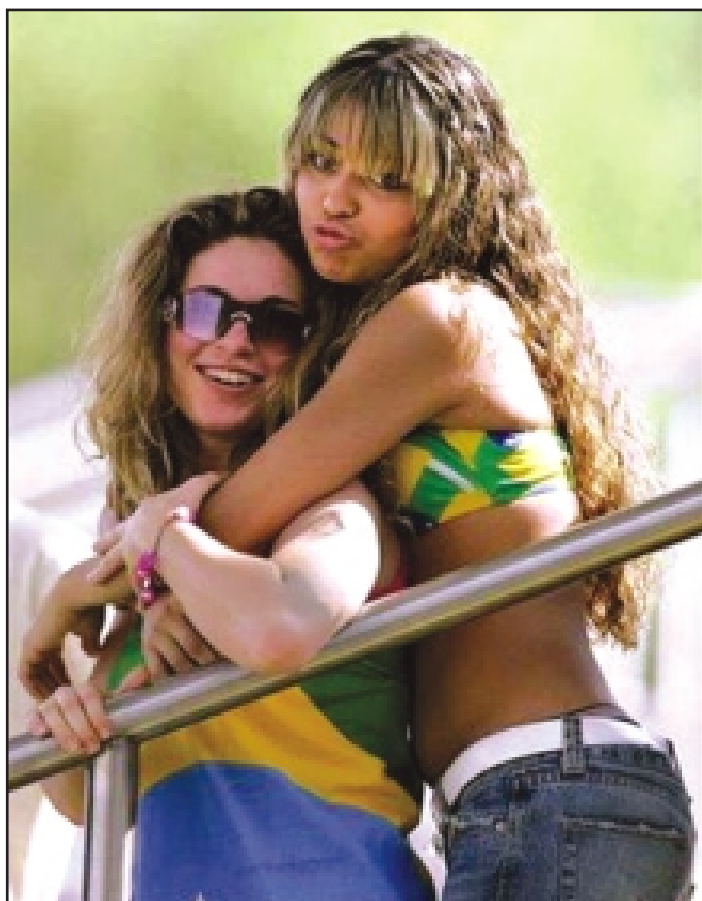
