Speakers tell CPB meeting



Five killed, 21 injured in road accidents

At least five people were killed and 21 others injured in separate road accidents in Dhaka, Comilla and Rajshahi in two days.

UNB adds, Imam of a Bangladesh University for Engineering Technology (BUET) dormitory mosque was killed in a road accident at Bakshibazar in the city yesterday afternoon.

Family sources said Maulana M Abdul Kalam Azad, 40, was run over by a Ghati-bound bus in front of the Education Board at Bakshibazar at about 2:00pm while he was crossing the road.

He was rushed to the Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH), where doctors declared him dead on arrival.

The body has been sent to the hospital morgue for autopsy.

The bus sped away from the scene after the accident.

Maulana Azad was the imam of BUET's Shaheed Smriti Hall mosque.

BDNEWS from Comilla reports, one policeman was killed and another injured when a bus and a police pickup collided at Gouripur in Daudkandi upazila early yesterday.

Sources close to Daudkandi then said a Rangpur-bound Hanif Paribahan bus crashed into the police pickup from behind throwing out policeman Abdul Wadud at

Amirabad of Gouripur. He died on his way to hospital. Another policeman Kobad was injured.

BSS from Rajshahi adds, three people were killed and more than 20 others injured in separate road accidents in the district on Friday, police and hospital sources here said yesterday.

Of them, one Ibrahim, 55, a resident of Koyerdara village was killed on the spot when a Dhaka-bound coach from Chapainawabganj ran over him at Kadriganj under Boalia Police Station in the city.

Agitated mob in the area damaged two motor vehicles following the accident.

Another identified as Toyob Ali, 60, who was grievously injured when fell from the roof of a running bus at Arani under Bagha upazila succumbed to his injuries on Friday night at Rajshahi Medical College Hospital (RMCH).

Meanwhile a passenger bus and truck collided at Tarapur area on Rajshahi-Natore highway under Puthia upazila leaving some 21 passengers of the bus injured seriously.

Some of them were rushed to the Rajshahi Medical College Hospital (RMCH) where the attending doctors declared one Waliullah, 23, dead after a few hours of admission.

Laying the foundation stone of the new water plant, Mayor Minu said that the plant will treat water from the Padma and supply the safe water to 60 percent of city dwellers.

RCC Chief Engineer Santi Dutta Gupta said the new plant would be named after Queen Hemanta Kumari to preserve her memory and the equipment of old plant would be given to the Barind Research Museum.

Today is the first death anniversary of engineer Abdul Mannan, former executive engineer of PWD (E/M) Department, says a press release.


On the occasion, a milad mahfil will be held at Park Palace at House-7, Road 12-A, Flat-D3, Dhamondi in the city after Magrib prayers.

Rajshahi city dwellers against demolition of historical structure

The Rajshahi City Corporation is going to knock down a 70-year-old 'Queen Hemanta Kumari Water Works' with historic importance to accommodate a new water treatment plant.

While the city dwellers are demanding steps to protect the historical structure, Mayor Mizanur Rahman Minu laid the foundation stone of the new plant at the water works site at Hatim Khan in the city on Friday.

The authorities have already floated tender notice to put the building and the ancient water pumps and water supply equipment on auction. The last date for submitting tenders is July 7.
