

## Arrest warrant against

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filed the cases against five persons including the editors and publishers of Prothom Alo and Janakantha.

Besides issuing bailable warrant of arrest against Prothom Alo Editor Motiur Rahman and Janakantha Editor and Publisher Mohammad Atiq Ullah Khan Masud, Metropolitan Magistrate AJM Abdullahel Baki issued summons upon Prothom Alo Publisher Mahfuz Anam and Janakantha Advisory Editor Toab Khan and Executive Editor Borhan Ahmed.

Accompanied by a few hundred of his supporters, Pintu went to the courthouse in a procession and filed a case against the editor and publisher of Prothom Alo and another against the rest three.

Although there is prohibition imposed by the High Court on processions and rallies on the court premises, they entered the court area in procession, halting court proceedings for about an hour.

Pintu protested a part of a report on placing wreaths on the body of Sagir published in Prothom Alo on June 26 that said the Jubo Dal leader lobbied with the Dhaka City Corporation mayor for getting the renovation works of the Ahsan Manjil and locked in conflict with Pintu over this. "In fact, the renovation work is an under-implementation project of PWD [Department of Public Works], not of Dhaka City Corporation. So, the information of lobbying and conflict with Pintu is false, imaginary and motivated," the complaint said.

Pintu also protested another Prothom Alo news of June 28 that said the detectives were suspecting Pintu's involvement in Sagir murder.

Innumerable false and imaginary information of the report, including "he [Pintu] succeeded to drop the name of his brother from the complaint of Shakil and Sentu murder by applying his influence" and "Sagir was angered and hurled abusive words at Pintu" recently after Pintu got construction work of the Tk 2 crore reform work for Ahsan Manjil and another Tk 5 crore work of the Health Directorate" tainted the reputation and tarnished the image of Pintu, said the complaint.

Pintu said the judge of the Speedy Trial Tribunal-4 acquitted the complainant's brother in his judgement of the Shakil and Sentu killings as the charge was not proved against him.

Protesting another Prothom Alo report of June 29 that said a meeting was held to settle the conflict between Sagir and Pintu's brother, the complainant said Sagir had never had any conflict with Pintu's brother Monir who has been suffering from brain tumour for several years.

The BNP lawmaker protested another Prothom Alo report of June 30 that said killers of Sagir had been ordered to leave the country and five including two of Pintu's brothers have been identified as Sagir's killers. He also protested part of the report that said the suspected killers had gone into hiding under the shelter of the influential lawmaker and said he or his family members had never fostered any relation with Sagir's killers.

"The accused have published such derogatory reports in the Prothom Alo for political gain by hiding the real killers," said the complaint.

The other case filed against the Janakantha editors and publisher said that a June 25 Janakantha report on Sagir murder hinted at Pintu.

On a Janakantha report on the following day that said Sagir locked in conflict with Pintu over the Tk 2 crore renovation work of Ahsan Manjil, Pintu said the work was of Tk 47 lakh and Sagir never applied to get the work.

Pintu protested a June 27 report of Janakantha that said the killers were close to Pintu's brother Monir. He also protested a June 28 Janakantha news which said Monir had a conflict with Sagir and a meeting was convened to settle the conflict.

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its unexpected new partner Niko Resources. Tullow says Tengratila blowouts raise questions about Niko's ability.

The block was awarded to US giant Chevron-Texaco and Irish company Tullow Oil, with a 10 percent complimentary share for Bapex, through a reduction Sharing Contract (PSC) back in 2001. Later in September 2003, Chevron-Texaco sold its shares to Canadian Niko Resources, which was found disqualified in the second round bid in 1997.

Under the PSC, during the first three years of exploration, Tullow was the block's operator. In the second phase that involves development of discovered gas field, Chevron-Texaco was supposed to be the operator. The first three years ended in February 2004 but Petrobangla gave it an additional 120 days extension. Tullow discovered a gas field in Lalmai and Bangora.

Tullow was unwilling to accept Niko as its partner and 60 percent stakeholder of the PSC (Chevron-Texaco, being two large entities back then, got 30 percent share each). And it had expressed its reservations on the prospect of seeing Niko as lead operator in development phase. While Tullow is a small company itself, Niko is even smaller and inexperienced.

But soon after the PSC's first phase was over in August last year, a total stagnation prevailed in the block. Other than Tullow's objection to Niko's operatorship, a number of legal issues hindered Niko from taking over the block.

Following the Tengratila second blow out, Tullow went to Niko on July 5 saying, "For various reasons we would not be willing to transfer operatorship to Niko, our view has been reinforced by Niko's recent operational experiences in Bangladesh."

Earlier in June, Petrobangla gave its observation on the stalemate saying that legally there is no

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the ailing boy. Students from across the country collected money to help him and nearly Tk 1 crore was collected in no time. "We had to keep eyes on him constantly as we knew he would die within five minutes if his windpipe got disconnected. It got displaced a few times before but we managed to fix it. Yesterday nobody was around and he died," Moshir said.

The family sources said his father was in his workplace while his mother was in the kitchen when Amit died. Amit was reading a Bangla newspaper after having breakfast when his mother saw him alive for the last time.

"The mother suddenly realised that she had not heard anything from Amit for a few minutes and rushed to his bed. The windpipe was disconnected and Amit's face had become yellow," said his father.

His family members rushed him to the local doctors and then to the BSMMUH. Doctors announced his death at noon.

His namaz e janaja was held in Basabo and later he was buried at the Banani graveyard last night.

## Fire shrinks

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The drilling rig manager and some other staff of Century Resources visited Tengratila yesterday to inspect the gas field and the proposed location for a second relief well, where preliminary preparations have been going on for the last few days. Niko has hired Century, an Australian company, to drill the second relief well.

A drilling rig of Century from Unocal's Moulvibazar gas field is on the way and may reach Tengratila within a day or two, a Niko official said yesterday. Some of the materials of Parker, a US drilling company, used for drilling the first relief well now on fire will also be used for drilling the second, he said, adding they expect to start drilling by July 25.

Meanwhile, Unicef has undertaken an initiative to arrange for arsenic-free drinking water for the locals, said a Unicef official yesterday. The UN agency will install pond sand filters in the area soon through the Department of Public Health Engineering.

Sunamganj Bachao, a citizens forum of Sunamganj district, yesterday afternoon called for a dawn-to-dusk hartal on Sunday in the district protesting the 'destruction of huge natural gas at Tengratila gas field by the Canadian company, Niko'.

The announcement came at a rally held at Traffic Point in Sunamganj district town. A procession of several thousand people preceded the meeting chaired by former lawmaker Prosun Kanti Roy and addressed by Sunamganj Poura Shava Chairman Mominul Moudjin, among others.

In Sylhet, the district unit of Jatiya Samajtantrik Dal (JSD-Rab) held a protest rally at Court Point in the afternoon. Jago Sylhet, a local organisation, formed a human chain followed by another rally at the same place in the afternoon demonstrating against the repeated blowouts at Tengratila gas field.

operator for the second phase of the PSC, although Chevron-Texaco sold its concerns to Niko.

Petrobangla cited different clauses of the PSC and the Joint Operating Agreement (JOA), and said, "...shares and related liabilities were sold to Niko, but they did not assign their rights, interests and obligations under the contract. Since there was no assignment to Niko, as such, Niko cannot claim to be the assignee of Chevron and therefore, they are not Contractors as per definition given in Article 1.25 of the PSC, and since they are not contractors, they are not also a party in JOA."

The PSC states that a contractor under the JOA can assign any part or all of its rights, interest and obligations to a third party subject to prior written approval of the government and Petrobangla. In case of the Chevron-Texaco's sale to Niko, it was unilaterally done.

"The sale of Chevron's shares stand legal because any company has the right to sell its shares. But the PSC dictates that it has to take permission to assign its rights and interests to third party, which has not been done. Therefore, Niko is nobody in terms of a stake holder of the PSC," said a PSC expert.

Petrobangla Director of PSC Raihan Abedin in a letter asked Tullow and its partners to decide among themselves who would be the operator once declaration of commercial discovery of gas is made and who would be the operator, and forward the same for decision to Petrobangla.

"Petrobangla can only at that stage intervene to give approval or to decide the ability of the proposed new operator," the letter said.

If this problem is resolved, the Block 9 PSC will get four years of extension for gas field development and seven years for production following a successful development phase.

## 2 teachers

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Locals and Dipu's parents alleged Shaheena and three other teachers severely beat up him on Saturday over a trivial matter.

Hasina, also president of the main opposition Awami League, lambasted Commerce Minister Altaf Hossain Chowdhury for what she termed his failure to contain price hike of essentials, which, she said, caused heavy sufferings to the common people.

Referring to the commerce minister's denial of the price hike, the AL chief remarked, "All the ministers of the coalition government have made so much through corruption that the price hike of essentials does not trouble them at all."

Pointing at the recent resignation of state minister for energy and mineral resources AKM Mosharrar Hossain, she said Prime Minister Khaleda Zia should have resigned too.

"The prime minister as the head of government cannot shake off her responsibility for the graft," the opposition leader observed.

Alluding to the allegation of corruption against the state minister for education by some ruling party lawmakers, Hasina said, "When their own MPs are bringing accusations of corruption against ministers, how does the government cling to power?"

The AL chief also criticised Jamaat-e-Islami, a partner of the four-party coalition, for misusing religion to reap political benefits. She also pointed out that "Nizami himself admitted that they had formed the coalition with BNP not to serve Islam but to resist Awami League and to come to power."

"There would be no discipline in the judiciary unless this trend is stopped," he noted.

"The judges themselves are blocking the stream of justice. They are destroying the very platform they are supposed to deliver from," said Barrister Amir, convenor of pro-opposition Sammitilo Ainijibi Samannoy Parishad. The law minister, however, maintained that the judiciary is independent though it is yet to be separated from the executive. "Judges are given total freedom and the constitution or law is not responsible if they themselves violate their own freedom."

It is natural that politicians will look at things from political perspectives, but it is the responsibility of the judges to protect the judiciary, Moudud added. He, however, said it is difficult to find out neutral people for appointment as judge.

Bangladesh Bar Council Vice-chairman Barrister Rakanuddin Mahmud said the judiciary has been dogged by an "acute crisis" not seen before in the last 35 years. The professional freedom of the lawyers is also being violated, he noted.

## New discords

"Both the sides will appoint a number of consultants to get their opinions about the complex investment deal," Alan Rosling, executive director of Tata Group, said after the meeting.

Tata will again sit with the government on July 25 on the crucial tax incentive and gas and power pricing. Tata seeks special tax incentive while the government wants to stick to the existing laws.

## JS bodies

The chief whip, however, opposed the decision, saying that there is no such time limit mentioned in the constitution.

## World leaders pledge

attacks on the civilised world and said they would stand together to defeat deadly extremism.

"We condemn utterly these barbaric attacks," the G8 said in a statement read by the visibly shaken summit host, British Prime Minister Tony Blair.

"We are united in our resolve to confront and defeat this terrorism. This is not an attack on one nation, but on all nations and on civilised people everywhere," Blair said, flanked by the leaders of Canada, France, Germany, Italy, Japan, Russia and the United States and five emerging nations.

As condolences poured in from around the globe, Nato Secretary General Jaap de Hoop Scheffer condemned the "appalling attacks" and said the alliance would not waver in its fight against militants.

The European Union called the blasts an "attack on democracy" and the "fundamental freedoms" that are at the heart of the 25-nation bloc.

"This is an attack on the people of Britain, it is an attack on democracy, and it is an attack on the fundamental freedoms which go to the heart of the European Union," EU commission head Jose Manuel Barroso said in a statement at a G8 summit.

French President Jacques Chirac told Blair of his horror at the outrage and expressed France's solidarity, his spokesman said.

The president told the British prime minister that the tragic events in London fill him with horror, and expressed his grief and condolence, a spokesman Jerome Bonafont said.

French PM Dominique de Villepin added: "More than ever, democracies must rally together and show unity in the face of the terrorist threat. More than ever, we must show vigilance and determination."

French members of parliament suspended work in solidarity with the

victims.

The Queen said she was "deeply shocked" by the explosions.

US President George W Bush, at the G8 summit in Gleneages, said he was "impressed" with the resolve of all the leaders to fight terrorism.

Pope Benedict XVI condemned the attacks as "inhuman and anti-Christian," in a telegram to the Archbishop of Westminster, Cardinal Cormac Murphy O'Connor.

He added he learned of the attacks "with pain" and wanted to assure the victims and their families that he was spiritually close to them.

The Spanish government issued a statement strongly condemning the "savage attacks" that rocked London and expressed its solidarity with the British people.

The US had no plans to up their own state of terror alert, the White House said.

But officials in Washington confirmed bomb-sniffing dogs and armed police officers were now patrolling the city's subways and buses.

The Australian Foreign Affairs office immediately set up a helpline for families who have relatives in the UK while Israeli ambassador to London, Zvi Hefetz, said that the embassy was in a state of emergency following the explosions.

Meanwhile London mayor Ken Livingstone said there was nothing terrorists could do to destroy the city's principles of freedom and harmony.

"Nothing you do, no matter how many of us you kill, will stop that flight to our cities where freedom is strong and where people can live in harmony with one another," Livingstone told reporters in Singapore, where the Olympic announcement was made Wednesday. (AFP/SKY)

"But you are pretending to be helpless. I do not think you will lose anything even if you lose the post of minister in trying to bring discipline to the entire judicial system including the appointment process," he told Moudud. ## Terror strikes London

"Secret Group of al Qaeda's Jihad in Europe", claimed responsibility for the attacks.

Police have so far declined to give a death toll or comment on suggestions that suicide bombers were involved.

Financial markets tumbled as the scale of the attacks became clear and Blair told reporters he would return to London from the G8 summit to oversee the emergency response planned to return to the talks in Gleneages later in the day.

The attacks recalled the 2004 train bombings in Madrid blamed on al-Qaeda and left Londoners in shock. The Islamic Human Rights Commission warned London Muslims to stay at home to avoid any violence aimed at them.

The attacks came a day after a jubilant London was awarded the 2012 Olympic Games.

"I'm deeply saddened that this should happen at the heart of an Olympic city. Unfortunately there is no safe haven. No one can say their city is safe," said International Olympic Committee president Jacques Rogge in Singapore.

Britain has been key ally of the United States in its war in Iraq, where al Qaeda is waging a bloody insurgency.

**DEAD AND WOUNDED**  
Police said two people were killed at Aldgate East underground station in the financial centre of the city, with a further 90 people wounded. Around 100 wounded people were taken to Royal London Hospital, 10 of them in critical condition.

Police chief Ian Blair said there were indications of explosives at the blast sites.

"We are concerned that this is a co-ordinated attack," he told Sky television.

London Mayor Ken Livingstone, speaking in Singapore, said suicide bombers may have been involved.

"I wish to speak to you directly -- to those who came to London today to take a life," he said. "I know that you personally do not fear to give your own life in exchange for taking others, which is why you are so dangerous."

People were seen streaming out of one underground station covered with blood and soot. Passengers were evacuated from stations across the capital, many in shock and with their clothes ripped to shreds, witnesses said.

The city's streets rapidly emptied and financial markets plummeted as it

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
