UAE introduces new rule 'Restore original to check trafficking in underage camel jockeys

UNB, Dhaka

Children from Bangladesh will need separate passports from September for travelling to the United Arab Emirates (UAE)

Major-General Saif Al Shaafar, Under-Secretary of the UAE Ministry of Interior, announced that only nationals of seven countries, including Bangladesh trafficking in underage camel jockeys, would need to have separate passports for their dependents. The other countries were Sudan. Pakistan. India. Eritrea, Somalia and Mauritania according to The Khaleej Times of Dubai

Children from these countries, whose citizens were required by law to issue separate passports for their dependents in connection with the ban on underage camel jockeys, can still come into the country on their parents' passports during the six-month grace period that ends in September.

The measure aims at preventing children from being smuggled into the country as camel iockeys, since the authorities discovered several cases of violations regarding passports of children arriving in the country accompanied by people,

who claimed they were their parents, but had in fact no direct relation with them.

The new rule has triggered several reactions among citizens of the aforementioned seven countries, particularly those residing in

the UAE. Some of them rushed to their diplomatic missions to get separate passports issued for their children before the summer holidays. Many fear that if they go out of

the country, they will not be allowed to re-enter with the old passports. Others who were outside the

country and wanted to return are confused whether they will be allowed to bring in their children, while still on the parents' passports. or they will need to have separate passports in their home countries.

Clarifying the issue, Brigadier Saeed Mattar bin Bleilah, Director of the Dubai Naturalisation and Residency Department (DNRD), said immigration authorities have given a grace period of six months starting March 31, the date when the new rule came into effect, for parents to obtain separate passports

for their kids. "Those who are residents of Dubai and are outside the country can come

in at any time between now and September with their children on their passports," he said, explaining that once inside the country, they can approach their embassies to obtain separate passports for the kids.

> "After obtaining separate passports, they will have to submit applications for new residence visas for the kids, going through the normal application procedures, including the payment of visa fee." he said.

He said the residents who have separate passports for their kids in their respective countries have nothing to fear with regard to the status of their visas

"If the kids are mentioned in the residence visa stamped on the parents' passports, they will be allowed to enter with their new separate passports. Upon arrival, the passports will be taken away by the immigration personnel at the airport, and they will be asked to report to the DNRD to apply for the residence visas for the kids," Brig Bin Bleilah added.

According to figures released earlier by the officials at the Ministry of Interior, around 49 per cent of the smuggled camel jockeys were brought by uncles and nine per cent by cousins, who pretended to be their parents

recommended checking of river erosion, use of common resources including ponds and lowlands and monitoring and evaluation of resource flow channeled through Vulnerable Group Feeding (VGF) programme.

Food insecurity and seasonal joblessness during September and October when the hard-hit ultra-poor are forced to migrate to other districts for jobs or fall back on money lenders is known as Monga, said Shawkat.

The non-income dimensions of poverty presents a more dismal picture, he said, adding that 99 percent of the sample house holds have only traditional lighting facilities, 37 percent are unable to purchase new clothes, 72 percent do not have access to reading materials, and their sanitation facilities are unhygienic

Sixty-five percent of the households depend on quacks, pirs and fakirs, he added.

Shawkat said, "The surprising thing is that 93 percent of the respondents do not have the access to credit from the govern-

ATTACK ON CPA **EVICTION TEAM** Nine arrested

Nine people were arrested in connection with the attack on an eviction team of Chittagong Port Authority (CPA) and damaging government properties and vehicles at Laldiarchar under Patenga Police Station in the city on Tuesday.

They are Syed Hossain, Hemayet Uddin, Ali Hossain, Md Saber, Md Raju, Abu Shama, Jahid, Ali Osman and Shafiul Alam.

Police arrested the nine the same night after raiding different places, and they were sent to the court yesterday afternoon for further legal proceedings.

A few hundred illegal occupants at Laldiarchar made the violent attack on the eviction squad leaving at least 20 people including three security personnel injured.

Some 15 vehicles including that of CPA Magistrate Munir Chowdhury who led the team, were damaged

The attackers also set fire to a CPA bulldozer.

Some 22.75 acres of CPA land worth around Tk 50 to 60 crore and few other important installations were recovered from illegal encroachers during the daylong drive

About 200 families were evicted amid violent resistance and sporadic clashes in the area adjoining Shah Amanat International Airport.

"The drive was aimed at recovering some 86 acres of land under illegal occupation for about 45 years," said Munir Chowdhury.

Port sources said illegal occupants are being patronised by some influential guarters with political leverage from ruling BNP and main opposition Awami League.

Later in the evening, CPA and Patenga police filed two separate cases against three to four hundred people including the nine arrested.

Presenting a keynote paper, noted economist and President of Bangladesh Economic Association (BFA) Dr Qazi Kholiguzzaman Ahmad said there has been a total confusion about the literacy rate and related issues as the figures provided by different sources vary widely. He said the net enrolment at the

primary level is 87 percent while the figure for the secondary level is about 53 percent and the adult literacy rate is just under 50 percent.

Although the overall progress has been significant, expansion of education is still a matter of concern, he added

But the quality of education at the primary level is extremely poor, Dr Kholiquzzaman said, adding that of

those who complete primary education, only 1.6 percent, as found by a study, have all the required competencies.

"This means that 98 percent or more fail to achieve the required standard of education at the primary level.'

The schools and colleges in rural and small towns are ill-equipped in terms of teaching aids and guality of teachers and from the point of view of management and supervision, he said.

Quality education is a must for the poor in order to acquire the capability to break out of the poverty syndrome, said Dr Kholiguzzaman.

He suggested involving local communities in addressing the problem, particularly in rural areas and small towns

Dr Shawkat Ara Hossain, Dr Ahmedullah Miah, Harun-ur-Rashid, M Habibur Rahman, Mostofa Kamal and Campe Director Rasheda K Chowdhury also spoke at the seminar chaired by ANM Eusuf, advisor to the Campe.

They said these women were enrolled in Ansar-VDP to maintain law and order, but the government is sending them abroad as housemaid tarnishing the image of the country.

The discussion on 'Sending of Ansar-VDP women to Saudi Arabia as housemaid' was organised by Thengamara Mahila Sabuj Sangha TMSS) in the city.

Terming Saudi Arabia a very insecure place for maids having an age group 25-35, the speakers alleged that the Saudi Sheikhs treat women like products.

"Who will ensure the security of these women when there are a number of cases of sexual abuse of Bangladeshi women who earlier went to Saudi Arabia and other Middle-East countries as maid? they posed the question

The speakers alleged that as the ministry concerned failed to pay their salary regularly, it is sending them abroad as maid.
