Shabbir down but not out

Pakistan fast bowler Shabbir Ahmed vowed Friday to stage an international comeback after being suspended for having a suspect bowling

Ahmed, 29, who was reported for a third time in the West Indies in May this year, will not be allowed to feature in Pakistan's home series against England starting in October unless he is cleared within the next three months.

"The report is highly unexpected for me, I am badly hurt but I have the confidence that I can improve my

bowling action," Ahmed said. The Pakistan Cricket Board said Thursday that a biomechanics expert appointed by the International Cricket Council had ajudged that Ahmed's action was

"The tests Ahmed underwent prove that his bowling action is beyond the tolerance limits of 15 degrees allowed at international level," Board director Salim Altaf said, adding that Pakistan would seeka second opinion.

"Ahmed is an asset for us and we will fight his case. The two options available to us are that we can have a second opinion on his action or we can go to the bowling action review group to contest his case," he said.

Rod Marsh believes that Kevin Pietersen is the right choice for England for the first Test. Pietersen, 25, has been included ahead of Graham Thorpe, ten years his senior, in what the chairman of selectors, David Graveney, described as "a very close call." Marsh, England's academy director, believes Pietersen poses more of a threat to Australia than Thorpe.

"Pietersen is a hell of a good player," Marsh told BBC Sport, "and the Australians will fear him. They have already seen his ability and particularly his hitting power and he adds a new dimension to the team. I think Australia would rather have Thorpe in the side than Pietersen, that's for sure.'

Allan Border believes that Pietersen's inclusion is correct, but that ultimately Australia will have the edge. "England has made a statement of intent by plumping for attacking, youthful exuberance, which is exciting," said Border, a former captain of Australia.

Heavy overnight rain and dark skies wiped out the morning and evening sessions, allowing just 25.3 overs to be bowled in a brief postlunch session at the Sinhalese Sports Club ground.

The short duration of play, however, proved disastrous for the West Indies, badly hit by the withdrawal of 10 top players, including the world's leading batsman Brian Lara, due to a sponsorship dispute with their cricket board.

The tourists lost three quick wickets as they took their second innings score from overnight's 17-3 to 59-6, an overall lead of 117 runs with only four wickets in hand.

Captain Shivnarine Chanderpaul, the only seasoned player in the touring squad, remained his team's last hope with an unbeaten 29 after 112 minutes at the crease.

His lone aggressive stroke was a six over long-on off left-arm spinner Sanath Jayasuriya, who was pressed into service because fading light prevented the fast bowlers from
