Brazilian

Brazilian football legend Jair Rosa Pinto who was known as "Master Jaja" has died at the age of 84 at his home here after suffering from a lung related disease, local press reported on Thursday.

Jaja, who gave advice to players ike Pele and Didi, was known for his small feet (size 4/37) but it failed to hinder his talent as he was the player who invented the dead ball free-kick and step-over.

During his final years with Santos, Jaja spent time coaching a certain youngster by the name of Pele who at 19 was already a world champion with Brazil.

Jair Rosa Pinto never experienced World Cup fame like Pele, he played 41 matches and scored 21 goals for the national team.

Jaja was a member of the Brazilian World Cup team that played in the "final of all finals" at the Maracana stadium in 1950 in which they lost 2-1 against Uruguay.

He couldn't understand how they had lost after leading 1-0 and he often asked God for an explanation.

Born in 1921 in Barra Mansa, near Rio, Jaja started his career in Madureira before playing for a number of big Brazilian clubs, Flamengo, Vasco de Gama, Santos, Ponte Preta and Palmeiras with which he experienced his greatest moments on the pitch.

CBF rejects Robinho's move

Santos striker Robinho's move to Real Madrid has been rejected by the Brazilian Football Confederation

"We are informing you that it is impossible for us to send the International Transfer Certificate for Santos player Robinho," CBF general secretary Marco Antonio Teixeira wrote in a fax to the Spanish Football Federation (RFEF).

"Santos will not accept the transfer without full payment of the buyout clause in the contract which is legally binding under Brazilian law, and which is fixed at 50 million dollars.'

Last week, nine-time European champions Real offered to pay Santos 30 million dollars, which equated to 60 per cent of the buyout clause, in order to buy their share of Robinho's rights.

The 21-year-old Brazilian international waived the 40 per cent to which he was entitled. "It's what we were expecting."

Real's head of media and communications Antonio Garcia Ferreras said from Thailand, where the team are on tour. "But I'm convinced that the deal

will go through and that Robinho will definitely be included in the squad when we go to pre-season training in Austria.'

Santos have turned down Real's approaches for the youngster, who has a contract until 2008, insisting that the Spanish side pay the buyout clause in full.
