# Dhaka hopes boost in ties as Natwar arrives today



Indian External Affairs Minister K Natwar Singh arrives today on a three-day visit at the invitation of his Bangladeshi counterpart to discuss an entire range of bilateral issues to strengthen relations between the next-door neighbours.

Bangladesh pins high hopes on today's scheduled talks between Foreign Minister M Morshed Khan and Singh in finding a common ground for resolving the outstanding bilateral issues, some of which date back to the partition of the subconti-

This is the first visit by an Indian minister after the Congress-led United Progressive Alliance (UPA)

However, Morshed had earlier visited India twice -- in May-June and in November, 2004. Besides, Finance and Planning Minister M Saifur Rahman and Commerce Minister Altaf Hossain Choudhury had visited the neighbouring country during last one year.

The foreign secretary-level consultations held in New Delhi on June 21-22 led to activating bilateral mechanisms to enhance cooperation in sectors like security, border management, sharing of common river waters and economic ties.

Highly placed sources said

Singh, who arrives at 10:00am by an Indian Airlines plane, will first hold official talks with Morshed at the state guesthouse Meghna starting at 12:45pm.

#### No charge sheet a year into Sylhet cinema blasts

At around 9:00pm of August 5, 2004, bombs blasted in Monika cinema at Bagbari and Rangmahal cinema at Bandarbazar in the city.

However, the bomb, kept in the Abokash cinema was recovered

Shahad Ahmed, 12, son of Anwar Hossain hailing from Jaintapur upazila died on the spot at the gate of Rangmahal while 5 others sustained serious injuries.

Ten to twelve including the killed street urchin and injured Anwar Hossain were made accused in the case filed with the Kotwali Police

### **Pro-BNP lawyers defend** clemency to Jhintu

Vow to resist opposition 'anarchy'

Jativatabadi Ainiibi Forum (JAF), a platform for pro-BNP lawyers, yesterday defended the presidential clemency granted to ruling BNP leader Mohiuddin Jhintu, a double-murder convict sentenced to death by a martial law court.

Addressing a grand rally of lawvers on the Supreme Court Bar Council (SCBA) premises, the Forum leaders accused the pro-Awami League lawyers of creating 'anarchy' in the judiciary for political gains.

JAF leaders at the rally announced a six-point resolution in which they vowed to go ahead with counter programmes to resist

Sammilita Ainjibi Samannay Parishad, a forum of the opposition

Yesterday's gathering was held amid tension between two factions of pro-BNP lawyers. The faction led by Communications Minister Nazmul Huda was bitterly opposed to holding the rally while the other one led by Telecoms Minister Aminul Hag was determined to press ahead with the

Huda did not join the grand assembly of the ruling party lawyers. But State Minister for Law Shahjahan Omar, who was visibly in favour of the Huda-faction, was present and

delivered speech. Speaking as the chief guest, Law Justice and Parliamentary Affairs Minister Moudud Ahmed described the presidential amnesty to Jhintu as 'based on the constitution'

He said, "Jhintu was tried in a

martial law court where he was deprived of his right to self defence and appeal against the verdict." Moudud also claimed that Jhintu's

name was not included even in the first information report (FIR) and there was no witness against him.

"If an aggrieved person, who was tried in the martial law court, now comes to the government with a plea for clemency, we will consider

### Hospital for FFs shut for years, tools rusting away

Valuable medical equipment and vehicles worth over Tk10 crore at the capital's Trust Adhunik Hospital, an organisation of Muktijoddha Kalyan Trust (MKT), are rusting away as the hospital has remained closed for the last six years despite freedom fighters' repeated demand to reopen it.

The hospital could not be reopened as some anti-liberation forces within the Ministry of Liberation War Affairs have been opposing it, some influential MKT members wishing anonymity alleged

Sources said five vehicles--of them, three modern ambulances with operation theatre facilities--left abandoned on the hospital compound are going almost out of order. The hospital also has a modern operation theatre and a laboratory for pathological tests, but the equipment is on the verge of ruining and may not be usable again.

A two-storev rehabilitation centre for the freedom fighters was constructed in 1979 on 13 acres of khas land near the Mirpur National Zoo. It was later turned into the Trust Adhunik Hospital in December 1991, aiming at providing freedom fighters with healthcare and subsidised treatment for their families.

Initially, the hospital was functioning well, but soon due to unknown reasons it was leased out to Umma Medical College Hospital, a nongovernment organisation, on

January 15, 1994 for ten years. However, the contract was scraped in 1997 and later the hospital was leased out to Captain Mansur Ali Medical College Hospital which ran until 1999. Since then the hospital has remained closed.

There is enough fund, furniture and equipment to run the hospital, yet why has it been kept closed over the years? wondered some freedom

MKT Health Advisor Prof M Amjad Hossain said reopening of the Trust Adhunik Hospital is a demand of the time as about 1.75 lakh freedom fighters are above 52 years of age and often need treatment due to Prof Amjad said only one cabin is

### Join hands to save country from misrule

Mainstream opposition leaders and civil society representatives yesterday renewed their call for greater unity of the pro-liberation, patriotic and democratic forces to save the country from what they said was 'misrule' of the alliance government.
