Sources said the clash ensued after Shibir cadres severely beat up Sajjad Hossain, vice-president of IHT unit JCD, over capturing a seat at Shameem Hostel.

The court recovered 11 types of dying colours from a confectionery and five from another. These were used to make cakes, biscuit breads, and candy more attractive.

Tk 30, still too tempting for cops

The matter was brought to the notice of Khulna Range DIG Noor Mohammad, who directed the SP to conduct an enquiry into the matter.

The SP found the allegation true following an investigation by an intelligence agency personnel.

EC plans to revise voter list annually

The Election Commission (EC) plans to revise the electoral roll every year to include in it those coming of voting age and the others that missed to be on the list during enumeration.

"We are seriously considering introducing annual revision system of the voter roll. We will go ahead with the plan after preparing a fresh roll for the next general election," EC Secretary SM Zakaria told The Daily

If the system is introduced by amending the electoral laws, the standard of the voter list will mark a drastic improvement. The number of fake voters will drop while that of eligible voters will increase every vear, the EC secretary observed.

Besides, it will do away with the need for preparing fresh lists hurriedly before every national polls. The list, if revised every year, will also be effective in elections to different local government bodies,

In accordance with the EC's plan for preparing a fresh voter list for the next parliamentary election, about five lakh enumerators will start going from door to door to collect field level information on the prospective voters from November.

The EC in accordance with the Electoral Rolls Ordinance 1982 has fixed January 1,2005 as the qualifying date for a person to be a voter. Those who are not less than 18 years of age on the qualifying date will be allowed to register as voters and the enumerators will collect information only from them.

In this process, the people who will become eligible after January 1 this year will not be listed as voters until publication of the final voter list in March/April next year. They can be registered as voters in the period between publication of the list and declaration of election schedule. According to the EC documents

66 die in rebel attack on Nepal army camp

76 troops still missing

Maoists killed 40 Nepalese soldiers in an all-night battle after attacking an army camp in the country's northwest. the army said yesterday, bringing the death toll to 66 after the rebels said 26 of their fighters were

"The terrorists inhumanely killed

40 security men ... by lining them up and shooting them in their heads. an army statement said, adding that some soldiers were mutilated.

'The security forces are continuing the search for the rebels in the areas from where they are most likely to escape," the statement said. An army official, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said 227

soldiers were at a camp near the town of Kalikot during the clash on Sunday night. Apart from the 40 confirmed killed, 111 had been traced and 76 were still unaccounted for.

Britain mulls secret terror courts

Radical cleric Omar Bakri leaves London for Lebanon; Egyptian biochemist freed

Britain is mulling secret pre-trial terror hearings in which a securityvetted judge would examine evidence without a jury to decide how long a suspect should be held without charge, two newspapers said vesterday.

If introduced, this French-style "inquisitorial" system of justice would mark a huge departure from Britain's centuries old "adversarial" process, The Guardian and The Times reported.

Prime Minister Tony Blair last week said the government was "already examining a new court procedure which would allow a pretrial process" as part of a series of proposals to clamp down on Islamic extremism in the wake of the

respectively. The court plan being considered by the Home Office would give a special judge access to sensitive intelligence material -- including evidence from phone taps -- in

drawing up a pre-trial case. The Guardian said.


