DNA lab gets going on trial basis

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The first ever DNA (deoxyribose nucleic acid) testing laboratory in the country has started functioning on a trial basis from April this year but its formal launch could be delayed.

The lab at the Dhaka Medical College's (DMC) forensic department was originally scheduled for a December 2003 launch but bureaucratic wrangles put back its journey by over two years. Officials at the lab who are now working on an experimental basis said that some more time is needed before it could be fully opera-

"We need to train up the police and the doctors as they are the ones who will collect the DNA samples from the victims and the crime spots. They must know how to collect and preserve samples prop-

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erly before sending to the lab for testing. Otherwise, the results might be erroneous," said national technical advisor to the DNA lab Sharif Akteruzzaman

"Lawyers should also know how to protest or substantiate the evidences involving DNA test results," he added.

Akteruzzaman emphasised on the need to build up a data-

base of DNA records with samples from the common people as well as known criminals. "For this we need help from the Ministry of Home

Meanwhile, employees of the lab are concerned about their job status as they have not been put under the reve-

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employees of the lab were recruited and since the experimental launch in April ,they have only received four day's salary in six months.

"Our job is not secured. The contract can be terminated at any time with a month's prior notice. Under this situation, it is impossible to give 100 percent effort," said an employee of the lab who also acknowledged the risk factor on the government's part.

"To train us, the authorities are spending a huge amount of money. If an employee leaves all of a sudden, then that investment goes to total waste," he.

The lab still does not have a direct phone connection and has to rely on the DMCH's PABX system. Lab officials have pleaded for internet connection but at the moment only the national technical advisor enjoys that facility.

Local businesses protest DCC's proposed Nilkhet Square

The decision of Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) to construct Nilkhet Square has triggered protests from local businesspeople.

DCC Mayor Sadek Hossain Khoka, on July 18, laid the foundation stone for the construction of Nilkhet Square a six-storied building --at the northern end of the existing market complex. The stone was laid on the footpath obstructing pedestrian movement.

He said the square was being put up to enhance the beauty of the Nilkhet area, and is included in DCC's development programme where multi-storied shopping complexes, business centres and apartments on its own land at Gulshan, Banani, Ramna and Mirpur would shortly be built.

DCC will own 25 percent shares of Nilkhet Square while Esna Resources, the company that will bear the construction costs, will get 75 percent shares. The construction cost is estimated at Tk 5.5 crore and is expected to be completed in 30 months.

"There are many educational institutions including Dhaka University around the site, so the square will become the hub of this zone." said Motahar Hossain

Jahangir, commissioner of DCC Ward number 52.

But the Bakushah Hawker's Market Cooperative Society. Islamia Market Banik Samity, Babupura Small Businessmen's Association, Shajalal Market and Banijjya Bitan Super Market and the local businesspeople are against the construction.

'The land in front of our market, for the proposed square, is government khas land. The authorities have not allotted the area nor has DCC got approval from Rajuk for the construction," said Nurul Islam Alam, general secretary of the Bakushah Hawker's Market Cooperative Society.

"We filed a case against DCC for not registering 1.7 acres of land within the market areas, which the DCC was supposed to do. The High Court on December 14, 2004 ordered DCC not to create obstacles to the place we occupy," he added.

A silent protest programme, by business associations of different markets of Nilkhet area, against the DCC move, was observed on August 3.

The protest demanded that construction of Nilkhet Square should be suspended until 1.7 acres of land was handed over to shop owners.

Shop owners claimed that they paid DCC Tk, 16.821 crore for the land and are still awaiting purchase receipts.

"Last month I spent Tk 2 lakh for interior decor of my shop. But now I fear that DCC might demolish it," said Sanaullah, proprietor of Anamika Tailors and Fabrics whose shop is just beside the spot where the square is expected to be constructed.

"I depend on the income of this shop to support my family and so are the three persons employed by me." he added.

Opposing the DCC plan to construct Nilkhet Square, Abdul Khalekh, president of the Bakushah Complex Samity said: "The market would not only ruin business of 2,000 shops, but also create severe traffic congestion."

But businesspersons of the already existing DCC market allege that Bakushah Complex too, is illegal as the land on which the Bakushah Market is located does not have Rajuk allocation.

The proposed Nilkhet Square will be built on 18.87 kathas and will house 483 shops with modern facilities including car parking, elevator and generator backup.
