The Election Commission (EC) yesterday sought Tk 146.29 crore for preparing a fresh voter list for the next parliamentary election.

The EC Secretariat requested the ministry to sanction the fund as soon as possible. But the ministry sent the file back to EC on the grounds of procedural flaws, officials said.

Considering inflation and inclusion of one crore new voters, the EC has prepared the budget which is Tk 50 crore higher than the expenditure of the last electoral rolls

In submitting the charge sheet of the killing of a CNG-run autorickshaw driver during May 21 hartal hours, the investigating officer (IO) did not follow the court order that asked him to merge the second case on the killing filed by the victim's wife

The IO, Sub-Inspector Sardar Yunus Ali of Khilgaon Police Station submitted charge sheet against eight leaders of Awami League and its youth and student wings.

Army men in jail posts rankle officials

Militarisation of the jail administration has sparked resentment among the jail officials as the government is appointing army officers one after another to the top positions of the Prisons Directorate, violating the recruitment rules

After appointing army officers as the inspector general (IG) and additional IG of the Prisons Directorate, the government has now decided to appoint another army officer as deputy inspector general (DIG) of the directorate.

The decision intensified the resentment among officials of the Prisons Directorate as the directorate officials are deprived of promotion to the top posts

The directorate saw the practice of appointing army officers as IG (Prisons) on deputation since 1977. But neither the existing recruitment rules nor the proposed new rules allow the appointment of army officers to these posts.

The establishment ministry in 2001 opposed the appointment of an army man as IG (Prisons), but it failed to make any impact on the government decision.

Jail officials have also submitted an application to the home ministry for cancelling the decision of appointing an army man as DIG (Prisons), but a ministry official said the decision is nothing new as the practice has been going on for the last three decades.

5,050 graft cases gathering dust

Govt fails to give ACC necessary guidelines to expedite disposal

Uncertainty looms large on 5.050 on-trial corruption cases filed by the now-defunct Bureau of Anti-Corruption (Bac) as the Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) finds that there is no clear provision in the ACC Act that allows it to deal with such cases.

The commission tasked with dealing with the cases, sought legal opinion from the government in this regard, terming removal of the complication very urgent for public interest. The government, however, failed to give any suggestion to

expedite the trial process, which is apparently benefiting the accused in

Instead of giving any clear instruction, the government told the ACC that the cases might be dealt with by the commission's prosecution unit, which is to be formed formally after the government approves the complete ACC organogram

However, it is uncertain when the draft organogram will be finalised as the government recently sent back a draft to the commission saying it was not properly formulated.

Since the formation of ACC on

Chevron Texaco says it completes merger

Four months after making a 17billion dollar bid to takeover Unocal Corporation, the leading oil company Chevron Texaco yesterday announced that it has completed the merger

Andrew L Fawthrop, president and managing director of Unocal Bangladesh, yesterday told The Daily Star, "The merger won't affect Unocal's operations in Bangladesh."

"There will be no change in Unocal's products or commitments and 99 percent of the Unocal staff will continue their services. The gas production will be the same." he said, adding, "We shall now appeal to the government for a change of the name. Once the name change is approved, we will start using Chevron's name

Unocal Bangladesh produces around 300 million cubic feet (mmcfd) of gas a day and owns energy projects in Bangladesh valued over\$1 billion.

Currently, it is committed to investing \$230 million to develop the Bibiyana Gas Field, which is SEE PAGE 19 COL 4

Oil holds near record \$65

Oil stayed within striking distance of Thursday's \$65 record high after a top energy body said non-Opec output was falling short of expecta-The International Energy

Agency, adviser to 26 industrialised nations, also nudged up its world oil demand growth forecasts for this year and next, leaving already stretched Opec to fill the supply

The IEA report came on the heels of US stock data on Wednesday that showed another fall in gasoline inventories in the world's biggest consumer, and news of less oil from the North Sea Brent field in September.

"The extent to which (the IEA) felt compelled to cut its estimates of non-Opec production is a bullish factor," said Deborah White, senior energy analyst at SG Commodities.

The IEA cut non-OPEC supply growth this year by 205,000 barrels per day, with production problems in the U.S. Gulf, Mexico, Norway and Britain accounting for most of the shortfall. Russia is also pumping less than expected

PM Leaves for China Aug 17

Trade, energy to top tour agenda

Prime Minister Khaleda Zia leaves for Beijing on August 17 on a five-day official visit when she will hold talks on bilateral issues, especially promoting trade and economic cooperation, and seek Chinese assistance for peaceful usage of nuclear energy, use of gas resources and water resources management.

Several Memoranda of Understanding (MoU) and a number of agreements covering tourism, energy, culture and education are expected to be signed between the two countries during Khaleda Zia's

Khaleda Zia's return visit to China within four months of Chinese Premier Wen Jiabao's Dhaka visit in last April marks the of 30th year of the establishment of China-Bangladesh diplomatic ties.

Bangladesh officially established diplomatic relations with China on

The two countries earlier declared 2005 as the "year of friendship". Dhaka and Beijing are working on

the peaceful use of nuclear energy while Bangladesh seeks Chinese cooperation in nuclear power for electricity generation, medicine and agriculture, Foreign Secretary Hemayetuddin told foreign office correspondents yesterday.

"We are still negotiating a number of documents to sign agreements on several issues," Hemayetuddin said, adding that Bangladesh will seek Chinese support to flood forecasting and water resource management. Bangladesh believes that regional

cooperation involving Bangladesh, China, Nepal and India in management of waters of the common rivers will save the peoples in the region from draught and floods, he said.
