


League of murderers


Those sensible human beings around the world, who have been seeing the carnage in those countries through TV footage and press releases know the extent of annihilation of the innocent men, women

Besides, Bangladesh is rich in natural energy reserves, hence foreign groups are always achieving ways and means of dubious entries with questionable offers and recommendations from the donor agencies. The absence of the Opposition in the JS allows the official regulators to reap dubious windfalls. The civil service has apparently no accountability. Several of the five dozen ministers do not know how to spend the time in enhanced public services.

Now there are internal factions within the parties in the regime for local control of development funds (DS, Aug 3). The transparency of the working of the PMO needs more publicity, for awareness, and to remove misunderstanding and doubts.
