500mw shortfall as plants shut down

Following the shutdown of several power plants, the country has been undergoing a steady power shortfall of at least 500 megawatts (mw) for the last one week, with no immediate respite in sight.

Power Development Board (PDB) sources said that different plants generating over 900mw now remained shutdown due to various reasons. As a result, the PDB is now supplying 3,251mw of power against a power demand of 3750 mw during the peak hours yesterday.

PDB allocated a 100 mw load

shedding for Dhaka in the evening while the day time power supply to the capital, which consumes more than one third of total demand, was uninterrupted.

However, due to line faults, system over-loads and other glitches in Desa (Dhaka Electric Supply Authority) and Desco (Dhaka Electric Supply Company), different areas of the capital faced long hours of load shedding, Desa sources said.

PDB sources pointed out that the level of load shedding will somewhat decrease after Wednesday when one of the plants, now shut down, resumes operation.

PDB says two 50 mw units of the Kaptai hydropower plant have been shut down recently due to a shortage of water at the plant site.

The Ghorashal units no. 3 and 6, each generating 210 mw, had to be shut down for urgent maintenance work recently. Of these, unit 3 will resume power generation from Wednesday. Unit 6 will resume operation from August 30.

The four units of Ashugani, which

have a combined power generation capacity of 724 mw, are now producing 424 mw as two units remain shutdown

A trader held to ransom by some criminals for a week was slain and his body was found dumped near the Meghna River here yesterday.

Sources said a gang picked up Kutubuddin Mithu, 26, a cloth trader of Narsingdi Bazar, from Khaser Char area in sadar upazila on August 9.

"The miscreants demanded Tk 10 lakh in ransom from his family over phone the following day. As the family failed to meet their demand, he was killed," said a relative of the victim.

Even ants dare not touch biscuits

Ammonia and other potentially harmful chemicals were found yesterday along with flour preserved in a rancid, insect-infested environment when a mobile court raided the Chandpur bread and biscuit factory in Hazaribagh.

Court officials found large quantities of materials used to sweeten the breads and biscuits, but not even legions of ants crawling on the floor and walls would touch them.

"This is sweetener, but see no ant touches it," said a Bangladesh Standard and Testing Institute (BSTI) official, pointing out cubeshaped materials preserved in an

uncovered pot.

The BSTI official, who was visiting with the mobile court, said the material could be sodium cyclamate, which has been prohibited since 1982 since it may cause cancer after consumption.

The court also raided the neighboring factory of Diamond brand 'Vermicelli'. Rotten and dirty vermicelli was preserved on the premises and mixed with the fresh batches. Members of the court expressed their dissatisfaction with the products,
