Poor pay hefty sums for 'free' treatment

Poor patients admitted to public hospitals under the 'non-paying' category are forced to wait for long and spend huge amounts of money for treatment, an investigation by The Daily Starfinds.

Abdul Gaffar, a 12-year-old boy from Kishoreganj, has been seeking treatment of his swollen testicles for about the last 20 days.

Son of a poor farmer, he had to drop out of school due to the disease six months ago. He has since been knocking at the doors of various hospitals to find a cure.

Such really poor patients are supposed to receive free treatment the maximum facilities from the state owned hospitals. But investigations reveal poor patients, once admitted. are forced to pay for medicines, surgical accessories, diagnostic tests and even surgical tools and hand gloves.

Abdul Gaffar's case is typical of many poor patients.

"About three weeks ago my father first took me to Johurul Islam Medical College & Hospital in Bhagalpur in Kishoreganj. A medical officer examined me and handed over a list of drugs and surgical tools

for surgery to be purchased before they admit me for the operation. When we inquired, an attendant at the surgery department of the hospital said it would cost us roughly Tk 15,000. But we were advised to keep some extra money in hand in case of any emergency," said Gaffar.

As Gaffar's family is unable to afford the cost of the surgery at a private hospital Gaffar's father, Md Yunus Gaffar, opted to consult doctors at a public hospital. After a long wait at Kishoreganj sadar general hospital, Gaffar finally consulted a doctor who agreed to SEE PAGE 19 COL 4

New avian flu warning as germ found in Indian vaccine

A Bangladeshi scientist, after allegedly finding the presence of avian flu vaccine in a poultry vaccine being produced in India, has warned not to withdraw the ban on imported Indian chickens, as this could spoil the poultry industry in the country.

The Indian government officially denies the presence of avian influenza in their chickens. But a Bangladeshi scientist, during a recent laboratory test, found the presence of avian influenza vaccine in a product called 'Newcastle' vaccine, designed to vaccinate Newcastle disease, a common poultry disease.

Sources allege that, as the Indian poultry industry wanted to cover up the avian flu outbreak, the vaccines were combined with Newcastle (Ranikhet) disease

vaccine and labeled simply as 'Newcastle disease-- Inactivated I.P. Vet.

"In the laboratory test we found that some Indian companies are producing avian influenza vaccine, and Indian scientists also admitted that they have been facing attacks of low avian influenza in the country," Dr MM Khan, an eminent poulscientist of the country working

Dr Khan heard from his contacts in India that avian flu was widespread and that farmers in India are vaccinating their chickens to protect their investment. Dr Khan managed to procure a few vials of the vaccines and conducted scientific trials on 25 chickens. Initially, the chickens tested negative for avian influenza antibodies
