Thousands march streets to remember Aug 21

Thousands of people yesterday marched through the streets in the capital and elsewhere in the country. mourning those who died in the August 21 grenade attacks.

On the stroke of 5:22 in the afternoon, demonstrators carrying black flags and banners began marching procession from the Central Shaheed Minar premises.

Braving the elements, people proceeded to Bangabandhu Avenue where the bloodbath took place at 5:22pm exactly a year ago, leaving 23 dead and over 400 injured.

At least a dozen grenades were hurled on the rally of Sheikh Hasina apparently in an attempt to kill the leader of the opposition.

Many of the marchers carried banners that read 'Khaleda-Nizami are the perpetrators of all bomb blasts' and 'We want independent international probe into the August

Senior leaders of AL, left 11-party alliance, Jatiya Samajtantrik Dal (JSD-Inu) and National Awami Party (NAP) led the procession in the

Many people who were injured in the blasts took part in the protest procession which ended on the Bangabandhu Avenue with the participants swearing an oath to resist 'violence against the people

under the BNP-Jamaat alliance rule'. Rasheda Akhter Ruma, an injured in the August 21 carnage, attended the programme in a wheelchair. "I am here again to protest the criminal acts of the present government," she said, adding, "I will at least find some solace if the perpe-

trators are brought to justice." As the procession reached Bangabandhu Avenue, the opposition leaders and workers raised their hands and took the oath to 'oust the ruling coalition, bring in a pro-people government, and try the persons responsible for all the blast incidents including the August 21



The Army is planning for the possibility of keeping the current number of soldiers in Iraq well over 100.000 for four more years, the Army's top general said Saturday.

In an Associated Press interview, Gen. Peter Schoomaker said the Army is prepared for the "worst case" in terms of the required level of troops in Iraq. He said the number could be adjusted lower if called for by slowing the force rotation or by shortening tours for soldiers.

Schoomaker said commanders in Iraq and others who are in the

chain of command will decide how many troops will be needed next year and beyond. His responsibility is to provide them, trained and equipped

About 138,000 US troops includding about 25,000 Marines, are now in Iraq.

"We are now into '07-'09 in our planning," Schoomaker said, having completed work on the set of combat and support units that will be rotated into Iraq over the coming

year for 12-month tours of duty. Schoomaker's comments come amid indications from Bush


BSP, Noab for tax withdrawal on newsprint

Rotten eggs on sale

A mobile court yesterday exposed a large-scale trade in rotten eggs following a raid on a wholesaler in the Sukrabad area of the city.

The wholesaler allegedly collects rotten eggs from different markets and supplies them to city confectioneries and bakers. The mobile court started its opera-

tion at 6:00 am to nab the culprit with the rotten eggs and found a large number of inedible rotten eggs with the good ones. But the egg trader, Md. Aliar Rahman, escaped arrest after sensing the presence of the mobile court. The court directed local Mohammedpur police station to seize a few thousand eggs and to destroy them and also to file case against the owner under the Special ower Act-1974. "We have raided the spot with prior information regarding his rotten egg business. He is one of the main suppliers of rotten eggs to city bakeries," said Md. Rokan Ud Doulla, the

magistrate of the court. The employees of the egg shop said they collect eggs from across the country including Tangail, Khulna, Mymenshigh and all the northern districts and supply them to different city shops. They also collect rotten eggs from the different city markets.

said the magistrate of the court. The same mobile court later raided anther bakery called 'Dhaka Bakery', a popular bread producer. When the workers of the bread factory sensed the presence of the mobile court, they locked the factory and escaped.

The court directed the police to break the lock and found grossly unhygienic conditions on the factory floor. The members of the court found they have been producing bread with a label reading, 'Home made bread' The manufacturing date reads "August 25, 2005" but was
