Intelligence agencies failed for politicisation

Prothom Alo roundtable told

Describing Wednesday's attack as the last warning to act against the rise of religious extremism, experts at a roundtable discussion on national security in the wake of the countrywide blasts asked political parties to reach a national consensus to resist extremism and militancy.

National daily The Prothom Alo arranged the discussion at its office, which was moderated by Editor of the daily, Motiur Rahman.

Successive governments over the years have exploited the intelligence agencies for their own political purpose, said former inspector general of police (IGP) ASM Shahjahan. He said the agencies have to serve the interest of the government, not the state and the people.

The former police chief pointed out that in addition to an opaque recruitment process, outdated training, lack of equipment and other logistics have contributed to the inefficacy of the agencies. He said several proposals were given

Charge sheet in Aug 21 carnage case soon

Bhuiyan tells party rally

The charge sheet in the August 21 grenade attacks on an Awami League (AL) rally last year will be submitted in a few days, BNP Secretary General and LGRD Minister Abdul Mannan Bhuiyan said at a rally in the capital yesterday.

"We have already collected a lot of evidence and the attackers will certainly be brought to trial," Bhuiyan said brushing aside AL allegations that the probe into the incident is yet to be completed.

The main opposition party did not cooperate in the investigation, rather it tried to damage evidence in the grenade blasts and other bomb attacks, the BNP leader alleged at the rally held at Muktangan protesting the August 17 countrywide bomb attacks, organised by the city BNP.

Both local and foreign investigators probed the grenade attacks but the AL did not cooperate and also refused to allow investigators to examine party chief Sheikh Hasin's car, the minister mentioned.

On the hartal enforced by the AL and its allies on Saturday, Bhuiyan said the shutdown created scopes for perpetrators of the August 17 bomb blasts to hide. "The hartal was

Spurious chemicals seized at Mitford

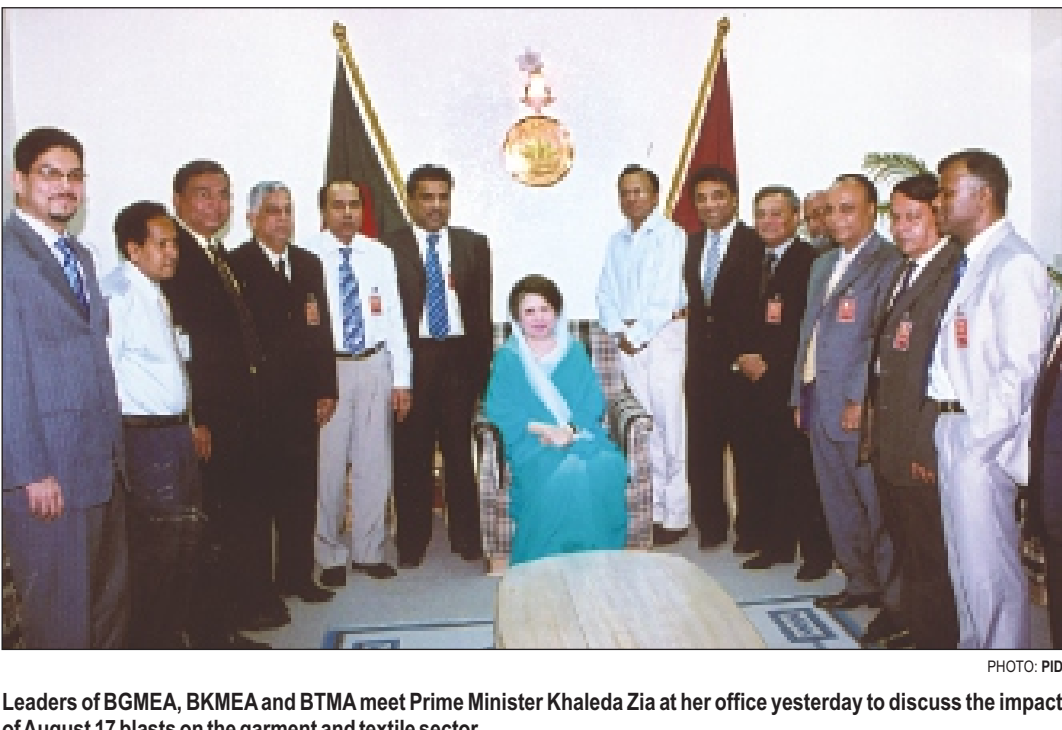

Curb on car imports by lawmakers

Bad news for the 45 would-be women lawmakers of the Jatiya Sangsad's reserved seats as the National Board of Revenue (NBR) has curtailed some facilities of the members of parliament.

An NBR circular yesterday said all new MPs will be allowed to import one duty-free car, but the tenure of parliament must be at least two years from the day of their oath.

The eighth parliament, which went into its first session on October 28, 2001, has only 14 months left of its tenure. The election to the women's reserved seats in parliament is due on September 6.

The sources said if the original price of a car is Tk 20 lakh, tax and other duty on the vehicle come to Tk 40 lakh. Ultimately, the total cost of the vehicle stands at about Tk 1 crore.

MPs used to utilise the duty-free option for their personal gain by selling the duty free permit, sources said.

Many enthusiast women aspirants to parliament consider it a profitable venture to become an MP despite high cost for nomination. Candidates of the ruling BNP for the reserved seats have to deposit Tk 3.3 lakh each for nomination.
