Direct election to JS reserved seats demanded

Several hundred women formed a human chain at Manik Mia Avenue in the city yesterday demanding direct election to the seats reserved for women in parliament.

Representatives from 31 women's rights organisations and NGOs joined the demonstration under the auspices of Samajik Protirodh Committee (Social Resistance Committee).

The government has not taken any initiative yet to meet the longstanding demand of women for direct election, although the ruling party had pledged before the election to meet the demand, said the women leaders.Rather, the government has undermined the women's rights by passing a bill regarding the reserved seats recently only for the party's interest, they added.

"We the women of the country. will never retreat from our demands for direct election and an increase in the number of reserved seats," said Ayesha Khanam, general secretary of Bangladesh Mahila Parishad.

She regretted that many women are now lobbying the ministers for nomination in the upcoming election to the reserved seats. "They even do not hesitate to pay Tk three or four lakh to get nomination," she added.

The women's rights activists also expressed their grave concern over a series of bombings across the country on August 17.

They called on the government to take effective steps to track down the culprits behind the bomb attacks and stop state-sponsored violence.

importance of the technology. Moyeen Khan said setting up of National Biotechnology Institute at a cost of five million US dollars is nearing completion. "The entire project has been funded by our own resources, which reflects the government's priority to the technology," he

ogy acceptable to all They said biotechnology will help the farmers improve food and nutritional security, enhance production efficiency, and empower the rural sector through income generation apart from reducing economic inequality.

MK Anwar said biotechnology can play an important role in crop production throughout the country, as farmlands are shrinking fast for various

reasons, including urbanisation and land degradation.

Emphasising the importance of public awareness, he said the technology should be used sensibly and responsibly to gain public confidence

in GM foods. Describing the biotechnology research in the country still at initial stage, he said the country needs to develop and improve the capacity of biotechnology research to meet the food demand of the growing popula-

He urged the US government to extend more support in developing

research capacity in this field.

Tariqul said food production has to be raised to meet its growing demand for the country's increasing population. "The appropriate biotechnology will have to be invented and applied to increase the productivity," he added.
