

Nizami says innocents shouldn't be harassed

UNB, Dhaka

Jamaat-e-Islami Ameer and Industries Minister Matiur Rahman Nizami yesterday said the investigation into the August 17 blasts should be carried out carefully so innocent people are not harassed.

"If there is any specific information against any individuals, action must be taken, whoever they are; but none should be harassed because of having cap and beard," he said talking to the UNB at his office.

Asked if the post-bombing political situation as well as investigations caused any distance among the allies of the four-party coalition, Nizami said, "There is no confusion between the BNP and Jamaat, rather the changed situation has consolidated our unity, foiling the strategy

Civil society role in policy debates vital for credible polls

CPD dialogue told

The civil society can play an important role by stimulating policy debates on different development issues prior to the next general elections to help hold it in a credible manner, said the participants at a discussion yesterday.

The discussants suggested spreading the policy debate at rural level in order to build up public

opinion through open discussion.

The political parties must also be included in the debate to make it more effective and conclusive, they said at the discussion on "Upcoming national election: Planning the role of civil society" organised yesterday at city's Brac Centre Inn by the Centre for Policy Dialogue (CPD).

While presenting a draft proposal on the topics for the discussion chaired by CPD Chairman Prof

Rehman Sobhan, CPD Executive Director Dr Debapriya Bhattacharya said holding an election must be credible and perceived to be free and fair by the broad mainstream.

He said in light of the debates held earlier in 2001 and 2003, the CPD is going to hold similar policy debates on important development issues prior to the next general elections.

FOOD ADULTERATION

Children at great risk

Children are at particular risk to the harmful side effects of food adulteration, which may lead to serious liver and kidney diseases including various forms of cancer and Hepatitis, experts warn.

The misuse of DDT powder, formalin, indolic and sulfuric acids, as well as toxic colors in food is now well known because of media reports, drives by mobile courts and investigations by Consumer Association of Bangladesh (CAB).

Now experts are warning that the potential threat of such adulteration is most acute among children. Junk food items like cold drinks, bottled fruit juices, ice cream, pastries and

biscuits prepared with sugar and chemicals create a light addiction and dependency among children, says Dr Naila Khan, director of the Children Development Centre (CDC) of Shishu Hospital.

As a result, they do not feel like eating nutritious food, which hinders their normal physical and psychological development, she said.

"The children become more irritated and cannot concentrate on their studies due to a lack of nutrition, which directly hinders the brain development," she said.

No formal studies have so far been made on the impact of junk food items, but in a number of cases it was found that the physical and mental condition of children

improved significantly after they stopped eating junk food, Dr Naila Khan added.

Other experts warn that chemicals used in adulteration directly attack the liver of developing children. "Toxic chemicals in food and impure water, even the over mixture of blissing powder in purifying water and adulterated oil are too dangerous for the children when their livers are tender," said Dr Reaz Mobarak, epidemiologist of Dhaka Shishu Hospital.

"These chemical ingredients lead to longstanding and acute liver infection, liver cirrhosis, chronic hepatitis and even liver cancer,"

Extortion charges framed against five cops

A Dhaka court yesterday framed charges against five cops and their three informers in an extortion case.

The accused, who are all in custody, pleaded not guilty after the charges were read out to them at the court.

Metropolitan Magistrate Mohammad Shafiqul Islam of the Speedy Trial Court-1 rejected their discharge petitions. The court also rejected their bail petitions and set September 2 for trial.

The accused are Assistant Sub-inspector (ASI) Khalil Ullah, Nayek Abdul Bari and constables Shamsuzzaman, Korban Ali and Rafiqul Islam, and informers

Agriculture wing's 50 vehicles untraced

Around one third of the vehicles of different organisations under the agriculture ministry are out of order while the Department of Agricultural Extension (DAE), another wing under the ministry, failed to trace its 50 vehicles.

The agriculture ministry yesterday revealed the fact in a report submitted to the parliamentary standing committee on the ministry.

According to the report, a total of 468 vehicles out of 1,344 under the ministry, are now out of order. "They are repairing some vehicles and also planning to sell some of them on auction," the report said referring to the statements of the organisations.

The DAE failed to provide infor-

mation about 50 vehicles among its total 153. Of the rest, 99 are now out of order, said the report.

Members of the parliamentary body strongly criticised the DAE officials for their failure to provide information about the missing vehicles and asked them to inform the committee in this regard at its next meeting after an enquiry.

Besides, 167 out of 310 vehicles under different development projects of DAE are now out of order, said the report.

The parliamentary body also discussed the agriculture ministry initiatives on soil testing programme across the country. The committee members decided to visit China to gather knowledge about agricultural technology.

Criminal killed in 'shootout' with Rab
