\$ 24,645 US grant to preserve Bengali art

The Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs, US Department of State, has announced that the 2005 Ambassador's Fund for Cultural Preservation awards will support 87 cultural preservation projects in 76 countries, including Bangladesh.

The 24,645 US dollar grant to the International Centre for Study of Bengal Art (ICSA), headed by Dr Enamul Haque, will support the preservation of nearly 30,000 negatives, prints, and slides related to ancient and medieval Bengali art and architecture.

The collection was compiled over the last 50 years, and the

preservation project will run for one year. The project will document and digitise the images, create a database of the collection, provide proper storage and train staff.

The Ambassador's Fund for Cultural Preservation is administered by the Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs.

Through a range of cultural preservation activities, the Bureau promotes cooperation with other countries to reduce the threat of pillage of irreplaceable cultural heritage, and develop long-term strategies for preserving cultural property.

Prior projects in Bangladesh included "Preserving the Music and Cultural Traditions of the Baul" in 2004, "Traditional Metal Craft Preservation" in 2003, "Preservation of Historical Documents from the Museum Commemorating Bangladesh's War for Independence" in 2002, and "Conservation and Improvement of Display of the Varendra Museum Collections" in 2001.

Environmental programme for students at British Council

BANGABANDHU MURDER Execution of verdict demanded

Bangladesh Krishok League (BKL) and Bangladesh Mukti Joddha Sangsad (BMS) yesterday formed separate human chains at Muktagon in the city demanding execution of the verdict in Bangabandhu murder case and trial of bomb attackers.

At the closing day of the month long programmes to mark the National Mourning Day, Bangladesh Krishok League demanded impartial international

investigation into the August 17 and 21 bomb blasts and trial of the perpetrators.

An hour-long human chain was participated by Awami League Joint General Secretary Obaidul Kader, Dr Abdur Razzaq MP, Haji Rashed Mosharaf, Dr Mirza Jalil and Motaher Hossein Mollah.

Bangladesh Mukti Joddha Sangsad also demanded trial of all recent bomb blasts including the August 17 and 21, and exemplary punishment to the killers of Bangabandhu.
