"James Anderson has big match experience with England and we feel that his inclusion in the squad will give the captain and coach another bowling option in the event of Simon Jones being unfit to play."



Blake baffles Nadal

The panache of Rafael Nadal proved no match for the appetite of an American making up for lost time at the US Open on Saturday.

Wildcard James Blake ousted the 19-year-old Spanish second seed 6-4, 4-6, 6-3, 6-1 in the third round to spring another supersized upset in the men's singles following the first round exit of US fourth seed Andy Roddick.

The rowdy home fans had even more to cheer when 35vear-old seventh seed Andre Agassi recovered from a slow start to beat another 19-year-old, Czech Tomas Berdych, 3-6, 6-1, 6-4.7-6.

Agassi and Blake, who is 25 and ranked 49, are potential quarter-final opponents.

"I'm waiting for the alarm clock to go off and I'm going to wake up," Blake gasped before a jubilant Arthur Ashe Court crowd.

"I can't believe how well things are going. This is a dream come

The American was ranked only 210 in April after a dreadful 2004 during which he broke his neck, contracted shingles and lost his father to cancer.

He flayed winners left, right and centre on Saturday and by the end French Open champion Nadal cut a forlorn figure, his trademark white bandana, pirate pants and grapefruit-sized biceps mere accessories to defeat.

The humbled Spaniard said simply: "I played bad, he played better. I lost a little bit of confidence because he was playing so well.

Berdych knocked world number one Roger Federer out of the Olympic tournament last year and Agassi looked to be in trouble when he was swept aside in the first set.

The chirpy Las Vegan responded like a twice former champion but Berdych would not lie down and led 5-3 in the fourth set before subsiding in the tiebreak 7-2.

"The first set was pretty scratchy but each set my quality picked up," said Agassi, who has so far made light of his chronic back problem. "I just hung on and played a good (tie) breaker.'

Another of the men's game's teenage talents, French 13th seed Richard Gasquet, outlasted Croatian Ivan Ljubicic 3-6, 7-6, 6-

Gasquet, the 2002 junior champion at Flushing Meadows, is making his debut in the senior draw and the 19-year-old matched his best grand slam performance having also reached the last 16 at

Wimbledon this year. Women's second seed Lindsay Davenport brushed aside Spain's Anabel Medina-Garriques 6-3, 6-2 in the evening session to set up a last-16 meeting with France's Nathalie

Dechy. French third seed Amelie Mauresmo eased to a 7-5, 6-3 win over Anna-Lena Groenefeld of Germany. However, Justine Henin-Hardenne and Elena Dementieva had to survive plucky fight-backs.

French Open champion Henin-Hardenne, the seventh seed, took the first nine games of her 6-0, 7-6 third round win over South Korean Cho Yoon-jeong.

Cho, though, suddenly came to life and forced a tiebreak with some punishing groundstrokes before Henin-Hardenne restored order, winning it 7-4.

The Belgian will face Mary Pierce, the Frenchwoman she thrashed in the French Open

final, in the last 16. Pierce, the 12th seed, advanced after opponent Jelena Jankovic of Serbia and Montenegro quit with a back injury trailing 6-3, 3-0.

Sixth seed Dementieva, who was runner-up last year, flirted with defeat in her 6-1, 4-6, 7-6 victory over fellow Russian battler Anna Chakvetadze.

As usual, Dementieva's game was infested with double-faults -she served 19 in total. "I have no excuse for serving like that," she admitted.

The Russian plays Swiss 11th seed Patty Schnyder in the fourth round, a repeat of their last 16 clash at the Australian Open which Dementieva lost having led by a set and 4-1.

Schnyder beat Japan's

Shinobu Asagoe 6-1, 6-3. The other all-Russian clash in the women's third round was just as bizarre. Anastasia Myskina. the 13th seed, squandered match points before losing 0-6, 6-3, 7-6 to Elena Likhovtseva.

Chile's Olympic champion Nicolas Massu reached a Grand Slam fourth round for the first time when he thrashed Switzerland's Stanislas Wawrinka 6-4, 6-3, 6-0.

He will play Argentine eighth seed Guillermo Coria, a four-set winner over Swede Robin

Blokhin keeps his word

He was a star striker in the Soviet era. Now Oleg Blokhin's star is rising again after becoming the first coach to lead an independent Ukraine into the next year's World Cup finals.

"We did it!" Blokhin screamed after hearing that his squad had qualified for the finals. "A lot of people called me an adventurer when I promised to lead Ukraine into the finals."

"I know that they will call me crazy but I believe that now we are capable of winning the World Cup!"

Though Ukraine failed to book their pass to Germany in a head-tohead clash with Georgia, where they recorded a 1-1 draw, they still clinched a World Cup finals berth after Turkey drew 2-2 with Denmark at home

Saturday's results left Ukraine with an unassailable seven-point lead over the Turks with two qualifiers

Ukraine became the first European team to qualify for the 2006 World Cup apart from hosts Germany.

"The dream comes true!" said the team's skipper Andriy Shevchenko. "I've got a lot of personal prizes during my career but I always have been dreaming to achieve something with my country's team."

"I'm happy! One should experience that feeling at least once in his

The 53-year-old former striker Blokhin, who won 112 caps and scored 42 goals for the Soviet national side and was the 1975 European Footballer of the Year, has scored another goal: making good on a promise many thought a tad bold at the time to get Ukraine into the 2006 World Cup finals.

"Blokhin is a man and a coach, who is full of ambitions," the head of Ukraine's Football Federation, Grigory Surkis, said after Blokhin was appointed in September 2003.

"He really cares about our football and the country's national squad. And he himself is a symbol of winning

The confidence of Ukraine's football supremo payed off as Blokhin called back to his team experienced veterans Vladislav Vashchuk and Sergei Rebrov, bolstering his side with a set of new and talented play-His squadron managed to collect

four points in a two-match opposition with Denmark and the European champions Greece, thrashing 3-0 the 2002 World Cup bronze medalists Turkey at their home turf. Ukraine have also maintained a

100-percent record in matches with the group's underdogs Albania and However, the country's first suc-

cess was recently under serious threat when Blokhin was forced to announce his resignation earlier this year after a row over his position as a member of Ukrainian parliament. Blokhin who won two Furonean

Cup Winners' Cups with Dynamo Kiev in 1975 and 1986, is a member of the Social Democratic Party (SDP) The SDP supported Viktor

Yanukovich, who lost the race for president to Viktor Yushchenko, whose supporters, Blokhin claimed, had driven him out as national coach.

"I feel pain in my heart leaving the team, which is my life and the heart of my desire to serve my Motherland," Blokhin said explaining his decision "However I have no other choice but to step down."
