24 Indian soldiers killed in Maoist mine blast

At least 24 paramilitary soldiers were killed yesterday in a powerful landmine blast triggered by suspected Maoist rebels in eastern India, a federal minister said.

The vehicle carrying the soldiers passed over the mine in Bijapur district in the state of Chhattisgarh, some 1,100 kilometres (700 miles) southeast of New Delhi.

Three of the soldiers who survived the blast were battling for their lives in hospital, officials said. The blast shattered the vehicle.

"We suspect that the Maoists are behind the incident. It is a blow to the state because the Maoist situation was improving in Chhattisgarh

He said the attack was aimed at derailing peace efforts.

Maoists have strongholds in at least five of India's 29 states including the eastern states of Bihar, Jharkhand and Chhattisgarh. They say they are battling for greater social and economic rights for indigenous tribes and landless farmers.

The three-decade-old conflict has claimed thousands of lives.

'They used a powerful explosive and that is why the toll is so high." said Arvind Vichar Netam. Chhattisgarh's home minister

New Orleans left to the dead and dying

As the last weary refugees evacuated from New Orleans, the shattered city drew closer to dealing with its dead, confronting a gruesome landscape of scattered corpses that were expected to number in the

thousands. No one knows how many people were killed by Hurricane Katrina and how many more succumbed waiting to be rescued. But the hodies are everywhere: hidden in attics, floating in the ruined city, crumpled in wheelchairs, abandoned on high-

Echoing the mayor's prediction, Gov. Kathleen Blanco said Saturday she expected the death toll to reach

the thousands. And Craig Vanderwagen, rear admiral of the US Public Health Service, said one morgue alone, at a St. Gabriel prison, expected 1,000 to 2,000 bodies

The last refugees at the Superdome and the convention centre climbed aboard buses Saturday bound for shelters, but the dying continued.

Touring an airport triage centre, Senate Majority Leader Bill Frist, R-Tenn., a physician, said "a lot more than eight to 10 people are dying a

Most were those too sick or weak to survive. But not all.

Charles Womack, a 30-year-old roofer, said he saw one man beaten

to death and another commit suicide at the Superdome. Womack was beaten with a pipe and treated at the airport centre, where bodies were kept in a refrigerated truck.

"One guy jumped off a balcony. I saw him do it. He was talking to a lady about it. He said it reminded him of the war and he couldn't leave." he said.

Three babies died at the convention centre from heat exhaustion said Mark Kyle, a medical relief provider. But some progress was evident.

The last 300 refugees at the Superdome were evacuated Saturday evening, eliciting cheers from members of the Texas National SEE PAGE 15 COL 7


