15,000 Bangladeshi workers in S Korea in arrest fear

Around 15,000 Bangladeshi workers in South Korea are now in panic apprehending arrest for illegal stay beyond a deadline given by the authorities asking migrant foreign workers without valid documents to leave the country by August.

The Korean authorities are now conducting frequent raids to trace and arrest workers staying illegally.

Over 50 Bangladeshis were already caught by Korean police and deported to Bangladesh, foreign ministry sources said.

The Bangladesh embassy in Korea has informed the foreign ministry that Seoul has not extended the deadline or declared amnesty to illegal workers. All such foreign workers including Bangladeshis are now in tension.

Reports from Korea however said a small number of illegal foreign workers left Korea within the dead-

the embassy said.

Sources mentioned that the quota for Bangladeshi workers in Korea is 8,500 but they number over 25,000 as many of them went there

with tourist visa but stayed back. Their number however declined due to raids on undocumented workers over the last few months.

Meanwhile, Bangladesh might even lose the lucrative manpower export market in South Korea because a section of Bangladeshi workers are leading workers' agitation on the issue of their rights.

The Korean authorities have already threatened to exclude Bangladesh from the list of countries sending workers, the sources

Harmful sodium cyclamate, textile dye, barley and essence are still used as the ingredients of ice cream, a mobile court found yester-


Sodium cyclamate, which is used as a sweetener, was banned in the country in 1982 as it poses great health risks. But the mobile court found traces of it while raiding three ice cream factories in the Narinda area, instantly shutting them down

Workers of the factories also nformed the court that they use the barley instead of milk. Besides using harmful materials, the court also found the environments of the factories were very unhygienic.

"The court is conducting successful raids everyday but the attitude of the adulterators is not changing," said one of the members

Mubarak set for victory in landmark Egypt vote

Egyptians were voting Wednesday in the country's first contested presidential election with veteran leader Hosni Mubarak all but certain to win a fifth term amid fears of widespread fraud.

The country's judges -- tasked with supervising the poll -- have already warned they would not endorse the result of the vote amid suspicion the regime would seek to

swell an expected low turnout to boost Mubarak's legitimacy.

The 77-year-old former air force commander, who has led the country for 24 years since the assassination of Anwar Sadat, is facing nine challengers, most of them unknown even to most Egyptians.

Two hours after polling kicked off, the all-powerful electoral commission announced it would allow independent monitors inside polling SEE PAGE 15 COL 7

Mayor orders forced evacuation

As floodwaters receded inch by inch Tuesday, New Orleans Mayor C Ray Nagin authorised law enforcement officers and the US military to force the evacuation of all residents who refuse to heed orders to leave the dark, dangerous city.

Nagin's emergency declaration released late Tuesday targets those still in the city unless they have been designated by government officials as helping with the relief effort.

The move comes after some citizens bluntly told authorities who had come to deliver them from the flooded metropolis that they would not leave their homes and property. An estimated 10,000 residents are believed to still be in New Orleans, and some have been holed up in

their homes for more than a week. While acknowledging the emergency declaration, police Capt Marlon Defillo said late Tuesday that forced removal of citizens had not yet begun. He said that officers who

were visiting homes were still reminding people that police may not be able to rescue them if they

BB froze \$1.462 of 2 Saudi NGOs last year

The Bangladesh Bank (BB) last week updated the foreign ministry that it had frozen \$1,462 in different accounts at four banks last vear following a United Nations (UN) inquiry about activities and transactional particulars of two Saudi-based international Islamic **NGOs**

The UN in a letter last July asked the foreign ministry to inquire about the activities of the Benevolence International Organisation and the Al Haramain Islamic Foundation in Bangladesh as well as if their accounts have been frozen and how much money these accounts have. SEE PAGE 15 COL 8
