No breakthrough in Teesta talks in JRC

The two-day Indo-Bangla water talks concluded in the city yesterday with no major breakthrough in sharing of Teesta water and India assuring Bangladesh of no water diversion from the Ganges and Brahmaputra under its multibillion river linking project (RLP).

Both Bangladesh and India agreed on a joint inspection by their water ministers of the bordering areas affected by erosion of transboundary rivers after Eid-ul-Fitr, the water resources ministers of \$ the two countries Priya Ranjan Dasmunsi and Hafiz Uddin Ahmed told journalists after the meeting.

Despite Bangladesh's concern over descriptication of greater Sylhet caused by India's building of Tipaimukh Hydrological Dam (THD) at the confluence of river Barak, the main feeder of the Meghna river system, India expressed its willingness to go ahead with the project, JRC sources said.

India, however, agreed to provide Bangladesh with detailed plan of the THD beforehand. If Bangladesh finds any problem upon reviewing the THD plan, India shall take that into account, sources said.

India, however, dispelled Bangladesh's concern over THD, saying Tipaimukh is a power generating venture, not an irrigation scheme, and it will not affect Barak's

150 JCD men made election officials

At least 150 activists of Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal (JCD), the student wing of the ruling BNP, and relatives of BNP lawmakers were recruited recently as Upazila Election Officer (UEO) through the Public Service Commission (PSC) ahead of the next parliamentary election.

Of the total 328 UEO posts, at least 150 were recruited from a list of JCD leaders of different universities and colleges prepared by top leaders

of the organisation and BNP lawmakers, sources said.

The identities of about 150 appointees were found who are involved in BNP or JCD politics. Sources said there might be many more persons loyal to the government in the controversial appoint-

All the appointees have been asked to join in their respective positions by September 26, according to an Election Commission (EC)

Sources said a total of 328 candidates were primarily selected as the UEOs. Later, 28 were dropped after police verification reports found they were not 'loyal to the coalition government'

Of the appointees, 80 are JCD leaders and workers of Dhaka University and the rest are of Rajshahi University, Chittagong University, Jahangirnagar University, Islamic University, Bangladesh Agriculture University and different colleges

Although the fishing boats were

caught by rough weather under the influence of a depression, the news

reached here on Monday.
Since then, 150 fishing trawlers moved into the deep sea in search of the missing fishermen, ignoring cautionary signal number 3 in Cox's Bazar and in the Bay.

The fishermen who survived said they saw 40-50 trawlers floating overturned.

"I haven't faced such a horrific situation in my 26 years of life in fishing," said elderly Abdul Khaleq, narrating the Saturday's disaster.

Over 3,000 fishermen Niko plans to drill 7 wells violating deal with Bapex

Canadian company Niko is pushing ahead plans to drill seven gas wells including an exploratory one in violation of its joint venture agreement (JVA) with Bapex, competent

The company will be seeking the approval of the Bapex-Niko Joint Management Committee (JMC) at a meeting Tuesday to drill an exploratory and a development well in the unexplored Chhatak east area, three development wells in Chhatak west and two development wells in Feni gas field area.

The blown-out Tengratila gas

field is located in Chhatak west area. The government had awarded Niko the unexplored Chhatak east in the name of "marginal gas field" area. However, Niko's latest plan clearly shows that this is an unexplored

According to the faulty JVA, which is now under question of the High Court, Niko is not supposed to do any activity in the Chhatak east till it has drilled four development wells in the Chhatak west and brought into production 50 million cubic feet per day (mmcfd) gas.


