22 fishermen, crew members of 3 trawlers arrested in West Bengal OUR CORRESPONDENT, Barisal

Twenty-two Bangladeshi fishermen and crew members of three fishing trawlers have landed in the custody of Indian police after a storm in the deep sea forced the trawlers to cross into

Indian water. Eighteen more fishermen and crew members went into hiding with the aid of local fishermen to escape arrest after the trawlers -- FB Manir, Pinki and Rizia -- anchored at a fishing port in the Indian state of West Bengal on September 10, sources said.

The trawlers sailed from Patharghata coast of Barguna district on September 8 to catch fish in the deep sea, said the owners of the trawl-

The trawlers were caught in the storm on the night of September 9 and as the visibility was very low, the fishermen took shelter at Kakdwip fishing port, said Golam Mustafa Chowdhury, president of the Barguna District Trawler Owners' Association, quoting Gopal Chandra Saha, a fish mporterinWest Bengal.

Of the arrested, 12 fishermen were sent to jail and the others were undergoing treatment at a local hospital underpolice custody.

Mustafa said they were maintain-ing contact with the Indian fish traders and the Bangladesh High the trawlers back and free the fishermen as early as possible.

The project, once implemented, will seriously affect the life and livelihood of the people not only in Bangladesh but also in nine Indian states, they added.



killed for dowry in Chittagong

Two young housewives were killed for dowry in two separate incidents in Chittagong in the last two The victims were identified as

Taslima Begum Tuli, 18, daughter of Nurul Amin of Jamal Khan area in the city and Tania Tasneen Karnia, 21, of Patiya upazila.

Hanif Mohammad, 26, of Shantirhat Kusumpura in Pativa tostured his wife Tania for dowry since they got married some six months ago, sources said. Hanif picked up a quarrel with Tania for dowry on Monday and at one stage he strangled her.

Victim's uncle Morshed Ali filed a case accusing Hanif and other members of his family in this connection.

In another incident, young housewife Tuli died within two hours after her husband Alamgir Bhutto took her to nearby Nibedita Hospital in Panchlaish in critical condition at around 6:30am.

He fled the hospital immediately after Tuli's death.

The victim's family claimed the death as a "murder" for dowry and alleged that Alamgir married Tuli forcibly for money. In a complaint with Panchlaish Police Station, victim's father Nurul Amin alleged that Alamgir married Tuli without their consent on August 21.

Since then Alamgir along with his accomplices, Shafiullah and Hasan, had been demanding Tk 5 lakh as dowry from Tuli's family and threatening for dire consequences unless the demand was met, alleged Amin in the com-

It was further said that Alamgir demanded the dowry for the last time on Saturday when he warned Tuli's family to be ready to receive her body. Tuli's father said he received the news of his daughter's death from Alamgir at around

'Weekly dose of zinc reduces risk of death among children'

A weekly dose of zinc can substantially reduce the risk of illness and death among the young children in developing countries, says a study published in September 17 issue of the LANCET.

The study was carried out by a team of scientists from the International Centre for Diarrhoeal Disease and Research, Bangladesh (ICDDRB), Centre for Health and Population Research in Dhaka and ohns Hopkins University of the US led by Dr Abdullah Brooks.

Children in Dhaka aged from two months to two years who received a weekly dose of zinc had markedly fewer deaths during a one-year period of preventive treatment. The benefits from the zinc were especially noticeable in protecting the children against fatal cases of pneumonia, said a press release of ICDDRB.

Globally, about two million children under the age of five die of pneumonia making it a leading cause of death in this age group.

Previous studies, also from currently implementing a Bangladesh, showed that zinc could shorten the duration of pneumonia when given along with standard antibiotic treatment, but this new study found that zinc also prevents deaths from pneumonia when given regularly.

During the study from April 1999 to August 2000, the investigators treated 1474 children in Dhaka. Half of the children received 70 mg of zinc weekly and the other half received a placebo.

The children who received the zinc had somewhat fewer illness episodes of both pneumonia and diarrhoea, but most striking was an 85 percent reduction in overall number of deaths in the two groups.

There were only two deaths among the children taking zinc, but 14 deaths in those receiving the Most of the deaths in the pla-

cebo group were due to pneumonia, but there were no pneumonia deaths in the zinc group.

ICDDRB Executive Director Dr David A Sack said, "Our centre is

programme to scale up the use of zinc for children in developing countries. This new study by Brooks and colleagues adds valuable evidence demonstrating the lifesaving benefits of regular intake of

The World Health Organisation and Unicef recommends a 10-day course of zinc (20 mg per day) as part of routine treatment for children whenever they have an episode of diarrhoea.

If this recommendation is followed, a child's diarrhoeal illness improves more rapidly, and the zinc treatment reduces the risk of subsequent episodes of diarrhoea and pneumonia, especially of fatal pneumonia."

The study was funded by the United States Agency for International Development and the Swiss Development Corporation.

The ongoing programme on scaling up the use of zinc is funded by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation.
