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Python caught in Sylhet brought to JU Wildlife Rescue Centre

A python caught in Sylhet was brought to Wildlife Rescue Centre (WRC) at Jahangirnagar University (JU) to provide it with safe natural environment in order to protect the threatened species.

The WRC authorities yesterday freed the male snake called Python Molurus in an enclosure specially built for it, with necessary natural components, including water, special trees and a hiding place for hibernation.

The huge snake was brought from Sitges Ranjan Zoo at Srimongal in Sylhet on September 22. It is locally called Rock Python and lives in hilly areas.

Workers of the Srimongal National Tea Garden caught the snake on September 15 and handed it over to the zoo.

"Such snakes eat once a week and spend most of their lifetime in hibernation. It lives on small mammals and rodents," said Lecturer Md Abdul Aziz.

"We will release it in its natural habitat when it becomes adult," said Prof Md Mustafa Feroz, chairman of zoology department.

South Asia yet to achieve food security

Speakers tell Saic meeting

South Asia, the home of one-fourth population of the world, is yet to achieve food security and ensure nutrition for all, said the speakers at a meeting yesterday.

The 19th meeting of the governing board of Saarc Agriculture Information Centre (Saic) began at its headquarters at Bangladesh Agricultural Research Council (Barc) in the city.

Representatives from Bangladesh, Bhutan, India, Pakistan and Sri Lanka are taking part in the three-day meet.

The speakers laid emphasis on the exchange of data, information, technology and new innovations in agriculture within the member countries to enhance farm produc-

tion in the region.

They also stressed the need for implementing technology-based agriculture which will be cost-effective for the farmers.

Inaugurating the function as chief guest, State Minister for Agriculture Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir called for eradication of poverty of rural people involved in agriculture.

Speaking as special guest, Advisor on foreign affairs ministry Reaz Rahman said Saic should explore partnership or collaboration with other regional and international organisations dealing with similar issues under their respective mandate to share experience and information.

Pema Lhamo, chairperson of Saic Governing Board and programme

director of Information and Communication Services under the agriculture ministry of Bhutan, chaired the inaugural function which was addressed by Saic Director Dr Wasim Kabir and Md Sufiur Rahman.

Ambassador of Bhutan Dasho Jigme Tshu Thrim, Ambassador of Nepal Bhagirath Basnet and High Commissioner of Sri Lanka Gamini Sarat Munasingha were present on the occasion.

Later, Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir released a video film titled 'Jackfruit in Sri Lanka'.

Saic is the first Saarc regional centre established in Dhaka in 1998 to exchange a regional information network on agriculture and allied disciplines.

AGITATION AT JU Business admin deptt postpones exams

The department of business administration of Jahangirnagar University (JU) yesterday postponed the first semester final examination of 2004-2005 academic session for an indefinite period in the wake of protests by the students against the indecent behaviour of a teacher of the department.

The authorities took the decision at a meeting on September 24 as the students said they would not sit for the examinations until the teacher is dismissed.

All academic activities of the department came to a halt as the students remained firm in their stance and vowed to continue boycotting all classes and examinations until their demand is met.

Hundreds of general students brought out a protest procession on the campus at 11:30am yesterday to press home their demand.

They also burnt an effigy of the teacher, Tanvir Ahmad Siddique, accused of indecent behaviour with female students.

They also staged a sit-in on the social science premises at 1:00pm.

In a press release yesterday, the Shikkhak Mancha, a teachers' platform, expressed their moral support to the students and urged the university authorities to take necessary steps in this regard.

They also demanded formulation of a code of conduct for all.

Dhaka seeks Myanmar land for crop cultivation

Bangladesh yesterday proposed Myanmar to lease out its unplanted and fallow lands for commercial crop production.

Commerce Minister Altaf Hossain Chowdhury made the overture to his Myanmar counterpart Tin Naing Thein at a meeting at the commerce ministry.

Emerging from the meeting, Altaf told the newsmen that three issues - commercial use of Myanmar lands, relaxing the visa procedure and non-conventional shipping agreement came up for discussion.

The two sides agreed in principle to relax the visa process and extend its duration for the business people for their uninterrupted stay in the two countries for boosting bilateral trade, he added.

Altaf said the meeting also agreed to amend the existing Coastal Shipping Agreement to facilitate easy and cost-effective movement of ships between the two countries.

Tin Naing Thein said the discussions focused on increasing the bilateral trade relations between the two friendly countries.

Bangladesh fetched 4.18 million US dollar through exporting different commodities to Myanmar in 2004-2005 fiscal year while the bills for imports from Myanmar amounted to 32.56 million US dollar during the same period.

Thus Dhaka's bilateral trade with Yangon is heavily tilted in favour of Myanmar.

Myanmar defence team calls on army chief

Two robbed of Tk 50,000 and gold ornaments

Two organised gangs robbed a trader and a woman of Tk 50,000 and gold ornaments after making them unconscious in separate incidents in the city yesterday.

Mohammad Badal, 30, a readymade garment trader, was travelling from Tongi to Gulshan in a bus when a gang made him unconscious and took away Tk 50,000 from him.

A rickshaw puller rushed Badal to Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) at noon, sources said.

"I found myself lying on the floor at the hospital when I regained my consciousness," Badal told reporters. "After a while, it all became clear that I was not conscious."

In the other incident, two youths pressed a piece of cloth on the face of Fahmara Begum, 55, a housewife, at Town Hall in Mohammadpur area, making her unconscious.

Then they took away her gold ornaments.

Local people rushed the woman to the DMCH.

Wasa realises Tk 9.94 lakh
