Eying a place in **World Chess** C'ship

The fifth Asian Individual Chess Championship begins today in Hyderabad, India with four Bangladeshi players vying for places in the next World Championship in Arvier, Italy.

Grand Master Ziaur Rahman, International Master Reefat bin Sattar whose GM title is pending for rating, and IMs Abdullah Al Rakib and Enamul Islam Rajib, who left Dhaka for Kolkata on Wednesday, have already reached the Andhra Pradesh capital to take part in the nine-round Swiss League.

The competition will be held at the Kotla Bhaskar Reddy Indoor Stadium. Out of 88 participants from 18 countries, the top ten will reach the World Championship, which will be held from September-October 2006.

No Bangladeshi player has ever played in the top individual chess competition.

The Glamorgan paceman has failed to recover from the ankle spurs that sidelined him for the final Ashes Test at Jones took 18 wickets in the first four

Tests before his place in the XI which secured the Ashes was taken by Durham all-rounder Paul Collingwood. Jones failed a fitness test on Tuesday

and the chief medical officer of the England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB) said the Welshman would have to go under the knife.

"We have tried a number of measures to help Simon's ankle injury to settle, but these have been unsuccessful and we are left with no alternative

Pakistan host England for a threematch Test series and five one-day matches from November to December this year. The first Test starts in Multan

on November 12. England chairman of selectors David Graveney admitted that the loss of Jones would have a big impact on the Pakistan tour, notably as he is England's best exponent of reverse swing - a crucial ingredient on the subcontinent "It is big blow. He formed a partner-

ship as one of the four fast bowlers which proved such a test for Australia,"

"The combination of the four bowlers was really a perfect mix."

Jones has already fought back from one career-threatening knee injury when he ruptured cruciate ligaments on the last tour to Australia in November 2002, forcing him to spend a long time out of the



Skipper Shaun Pollock is demanding a big improvement from his world allstars to keep the one-day Super Series alive after a crushing defeat to rejuvenated Australia here Wednesday.

The World XI have only a day to regroup for Friday's second one-dayer at Docklands stadium after crashing to a 93-run loss to Ricky Ponting's team, bursting to redeem themselves after their much-criticised Ashes loss to England.

Only four of the world's best 11 players managed to reach doublefigures against the Australian bowling -Kumar Sangakkara with 64 off 96 balls and Ashes hero Andrew Flintoff made 38 -- in a match that proved anticlimactic a long way out.

"It's not that you lose, but in the manner you lose and for us to be seven or eight down for not much at all was probably the most disappointing part about tonight's game," Pollock said. "I can assure you that the guys are

proud cricketers and it hurts their pride, no one likes to go down like that, no matter what game it is ... they're definitely hurting.

Pollock said it was not a time to panic and he would use Thursday's rest day to regroup the players, adding that he expected them to bounce back. "You have to give them the opportu-


