

Tensions begin to build as months go on, however, when they come to realise that they've fallen prey to consumerism. Soon afterwards, they have even heavier problems to worry about, as a large gang of bikers discovers the mall and invades it, ruining the survivors' best-laid plans and forcing them to fight off both lethal bandits and flesh-eating zombies.
