China, US begin new round of textile talks amid doubts

China and the United States began a sixth round of talks here Wednesday aimed at settling a drawn-out dispute on China's soaring textile exports amid industry doubts of success.

However, government officials have maintained a brave face since the last round of negotiations ended without agreement in Washington last

"We hope there will be a positive outcome," said an official responsible for North American affairs at China's

Ministry of Commerce. The Chinese delegation is headed by Lu Jianhua, chief of foreign trade at

team is led by special textile negotiator David Spooner.

Issues under discussion include the level of quotas to be imposed on Chinese imports by the US, their duration, and what period they will be benchmarked against.

The two-day talks are aimed at a comprehensive agreement to regulate Chinese textile shipments which have soared since global quotas were scrapped on January 1.

Since then, the US government has slapped what it calls "cumbersome' quotas on individual categories of Chinese textile exports in response to demands for action from the US

agreement, CDF will obtain wholesale credit facilities for onward lending to its micro finance projects.

"We were able to make progress, particularly with product coverage and quota levels, but we did not reach an agreement with the Chinese," Spooner said after the last round of negotia-

The fact that a new round of talks was taking place barely two weeks after the last indicates that both parties want to resolve the dispute "as soon as possible," Cao Xinyu, from the China Chamber of $Commerce for the Imports \, and \, Exports \, of \,$ Textiles, told the Beijing Times.

But the Chinese industry has voiced pessimism that progress can be made, blaming Washingt-on's hardline stance for the stalemate.

Last week, Washington irked Beijing by accepting a US industry request to consider quotas on another 13 types of Chinese textile exports, bringing the number that could be restricted to 27.

The US inter-agency Comm-ittee for the Implemen-tation of Textile Agreements (CITA) said it would rule in January on whether quotas are needed against the 13 categories because of "market disruption".

Chinese textile exports to the United States have rocketed by more than 600 percent since global quotas on the trade were ended, according to

European Union finance ministers pledged Tuesday to take steps to deepen the EU's huge marketplace for goods and services in order to boost economic growth and create

Although some member states' zeal for further integration in key industries has sometimes flagged, the ministers voiced broad support at a meeting here to strengthen the EU's internal market.

"All member states recognise that to rise to the increasing challenges and opportinuties of global change we must intensify our work with stronger competition policies, better regulation, improved dialogue with our major trading partners and economic reforms," said British finance minister Gordon Brown, who chaired the meeting.

One of Britain's priorities for its six-month presidency of the EU is to encourage polices that boost Europe's competitiveness and capacity to innovate, which the European Commission insists is essential for stronger growth and more jobs.
