2 SCF leaders injured in Shibir attack on CU campus

Two leaders of Samajtantrik Chhatra Front (SCF) were injured in an attack by the Islami Chhatra Shibir on the Chittagong University (CU) campus vesterday.

Witnesses said Shibir activists attacked and beat up Md Zamir Uddin Russell and Prolin Chakma with iron rods at Katapahar at around 9:45am when they were going to their class-

Russell was admitted to Chittagong Medical College Hospital (CMCH) with injuries in his head while Prolin was released after first aid treatment.

SCF General Secretary Kanchan Sarker said the Shibir men were trying to prevent his organisation from waging its planned movement against the university authorities' decision to raise the price of admission form.

"We have informed the vicechancellor and the proctor of the incident immediately and they $assured \, us \, of \, taking \, necessary \, steps \, in \,$ this regard," he said.

He also threatened to launch a tougher movement if the authorities fail to take action against the persons responsible without delay.

2005 set to be second hottest year

Year 2005 will be the second or third warmest year on record globally, Britain's national weather service said on Friday, as climate concerns build among people in polar and low-lying areas and in the insurance and utility industries.

"Whether it is second or third depends on how Siberia reacts between now and the end of the year." said Wayne Elliott, Met Office spokes-"1998 was the warmest ever, 2005 is

looking at being second. It will be another very warm year generally, which is in line with global climate change research.

The Met Office bases its measurements on both land and sea tempera-

After 1998, the four hottest years globally were the last four years, according to Met Office data going back to 1861. The second hottest year was 2002, followed by 2003, 2004 and The trend adds weight to concern

among many scientists that the world is hotting up and that human activity, including burning of fossil fuels and generation of "greenhouse gases" by industry, is playing a major part. Two recent hurricanes have left the

United States with tight fuel supplies, energy companies say.

Meanwhile, in Europe Portugal and

Spain have experienced their worst droughts ever recorded, and further east, floods and torrential rain drenched Switzerland, Germany, Austria and EU membershipcandidates Bulgaria and Romania.

"The vast majority of scientists would now say that there is a significant, substantial human effect on the environment," Craig Hutton, project manager at the GeoData Institute, University of Southampton, said on

"I think that's good enough to get on and start to plan in reality for the effects of climate change."
