Morshed brushes aside effect on Saarc summit

Foreign Minister M Morshed Khan has dismissed any adverse impact of the series blasts in New Delhi on the upcoming 13th Saarc Summit, saying the South Asian nations could jointly fight against terrorism.

"We want to work together as we are determined to eliminate terrorism from our region and the globe as well," he told diplomatic correspondents at his ministry yesterday.

Describing the Saturday's blasts as "heinous and unfortunate", Morshed said the Saarc leaders at the Dhaka summit on November 12-13 could effectively discuss the issue of terrorism.

Anwar, Nizami leave most poll pledges unfulfilled

Two ace ruling alliance leaders -- MK Anwar and Matiur Rahman Nizami -- ran the industries ministry one after another, assisted by Rezaul Karim and Abdu Salam Pinto respectively as state ministers, but the situation in the industrial sector remains much the same as 2001.

The ministry in the last four years has failed to fulfil the majority of the 4-

party coalition's election pledges on industrial development.

Its promise to form a separate ministry for the textile and readymade garment industries by restructuring the textile ministry has not been materialised.

No headway has also been made to rehabilitate some 2,000 sick industries in the country, as was pledged before the ballot.

The coalition also had declared to boost the handloom and small and cottage industries by providing necessary funds, training and exploring markets. But, no major steps had been seen in this regard.

In April 2003, Nizami of Jamaat-e-Islami replaced Anwar of the BNP as the industries minister, while Pinto took over the office of the

BNP, AL vow to join hands for apparel sector growth

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TATA NEGOTIATION

Govt mostly depends on bureaucrats, not experts

The government has been handling the over \$2 billion investment proposal of Indian giant Tata almost entirely with some bureaucrats over the last one year, without much assistance from experts and any in-depth economic analysis.

Economists and energy-sector experts say negotiations in such a manner may not produce a win-win outcome, which even Tata officials want to see in order to avoid any controversy in the future.

Given the present strength of the government team, the final round of negotiations with a November deadline will need some additional time, the sources said.

The Tata proposal submitted last year has undergone several modifications and demands understanding not only of its technical aspects but also of its socio-economic impacts on the part of the government because of complexities of the package offer.

Tata initially proposed to set up a

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fertiliser factory and a steel plant that would consume some two trillion cubic feet gas over a 30-year period. Now it is also negotiating for taking a part of the Barapukuria coal mine for open-cast mining and for setting up a 1,000 megawatt coal-fired power plant either in Barapukuria or in Phulbari coal mine area.

Unknown Kashmiri group claims responsibility

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Sundarbans tigress fitted with radio collar found dead

The tigress on which a two-kilogram radio signal transmitting "collar" was planted on April 22 this year as part of a study on tigers in the Sundarbans was found dead in the forest yesterday, sources said.

The Forest Department and its tiger territory identification project consultant Adam Burlow determined from the carcass of the tigress that she must have died within the past 30-45 days. Her bones were found intact.

Apparently, the collar did not serve the forest department its purpose completely as the trackers had lost the receiver and the antenna in a creek when the irritated tigress charged them on June 13.

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
