HC verdict stayed for 3 more months

The Supreme Court yesterday extended for three more months the stay order on the High Court judgement that declared the fifth amendment to the constitution

The Chamber Judge of the Appellate Division Justice MM Ruhul Amin passed the order on a petition filed by the government.

Attorney General AJ Moham-mad Ali and Additional Attorney General Abdur Razzak Khan who thousands of moved for the government told SEE PAGE 4 COL 4 | journalists yesterday that they filed the petition for time extension as the government is yet to get the copy of the High Court judgement.

In a historic verdict on August 29 this year, the High Court also declared illegal the rules of Khandker Mushtaque Ahmed, Abu Sadaat Mohammad Sayem, and Maj Gen Ziaur Rahman from August 15, 1975 to April 9, 1979.
