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# Biman's obsolete planes



After a long delay, Biman Bangladesh Airlines is gearing up to upgrade its wide-bodied aircraft fleet with brand-new Boeing and Airbus aircrafts. According to various media reports, the Board of Directors has approved a plan to purchase four Airbus 330-200 and four Boeing 777-200ERs to replace its ageing fleet of DC-10 and A310 aircraft. Unfortunately, this decision is over a decade overdue and as a result when these brand new aircrafts enter service with Biman, they will be obsolete already.

Recently, Biman launched a massive public relations campaign to inform everyone how "old" and "unsafe" Barman's aircrafts are. Some of the Biman's aircrafts might be outdated and unreliable, but not all of them are "old". Biman had purchased three brand new aircrafts directly from the manufacturer since its formation in January 1972. The first purchase was a DC-10-30 in 1989 which was followed by two Airbus 310-300s in 1996. Biman's DC-10 was the last passenger DC-10-30 off the production line at California and only three more 310s were produced by Airbus SAS after Biman took delivery of the aircrafts.

A commercial jet has a useful life-cycle of roughly thirty years. However, after utilizing them for only one third of their useful commercial life, Biman is now forced to replace them due to their inefficiency and unreliability compared to new generation aircrafts. Regrettably, Biman's management is repeating history again. As airlines

around the world are gearing up to replace their current fleet of 330-200's and 777-200ER with new generations of aircrafts like the 787 and 350, Biman is placing fresh orders for them.

Biman's management is arguing that it needs new aircraft as soon as possible and they do not have time to wait for new aircrafts like the Airbus 350. The reality is manufacturers can deliver new generation aircrafts like the 787/350 around 2009 compared to the 2007 delivery date for 330/777. It might be difficult for Biman to wait two extra years for newer aircrafts but it will save Biman hundreds of millions of dollars over the next thirty years.

Purchasing a fleet of long-range aircrafts is a very expensive and complex process with significant long term implications. The current fleet renewal proposal will cost Biman about a billion dollar to implement. It is vital for a small airline like Biman to make the right decisions in order to survive in today's world. Any wrong decision will influence Biman's balance sheet for the next three decades. The government needs to stop interfering with Biman's management in order for them to make the right decisions. In addition, the management has to stop depending on government assistance and start relying on company balance sheets if they want Biman to survive in the competitive aviation business.

## Human trafficking in the US

The Hurricane Katrina left in its wake many human tragedies. However, the most distressing are the hundreds of women and children victims left without any assistance or housing.

These young women who are the 'forgotten' victims, are often left without family or friends from whom to seek shelter.

Americans normally do not anticipate that trafficking might occur in their country, but desperation and lack of options have reportedly left many young women in vulnerable positions. The US-based NGO, FAIR Fund, has uncovered stories of young women being solicited by sexual predators and even assaulted right in the very shelters that were created to support them. According to the organisation, this is happening in the country starting from Washington, D.C. to Houston.

On 24 and 25th October, Lifetime TV premiered its new mini-series, "Human Trafficking," the first major TV network programme to expose the effects of human trafficking in the United States, according to a release of the FAIR Fund.

There are currently an estimated 200,000 girls in the United States at risk of sexual exploitation. Under Federal law, any child under the age of 18 who is sold into prostitution is a victim of human trafficking.

Yet, many are not treated like victims who deserve help, but instead are arrested or abused by local police. This year FAIR Fund and the local young women of Boston are taking matters into their own hands and demanding the local agencies and law enforcers to help prevent sex trafficking of minors.

## Kashmir issue

Kashmir is again in the headlines, albeit for a different reason. A tragic earthquake struck the valley and the death toll may rise to one hundred thousand.

Incidentally a few days back the former President of Pakistan O. Kashmir Sardar Abdul Qayyum Khan suggested, "Let there be Maharaja's rule in Kashmir. It is a lesser evil." He is probably tired of the events in both parts of Kashmir and speaking in the light of his experiences. Let us examine Kashmir briefly. Kashmir is part of the trio-- Jammu, Kashmir and Ladakh. With a population of less than ten million it is poor in natural resources. It does not have oil, gas, coal, iron etc. It can boast of the saffron and beauties it produces, and natural beauties. Tourism remains the main attraction and industry of the valley which has been nearly destroyed by militant activities. Economically it is not an important part of the world. So, the appeal for help after the earthquake elicits lukewarm response from other

countries.

There was lot of melodrama during the accession of Kashmir to the Union of India soon after partition. The Maharaja, Hari Singh, wanted to remain independent. He was coerced and later on convinced into joining the Union. Sardar Ballabbhai Patel reportedly offered to trade Kashmir in lieu of Hyderabad with MA Jinnah in those days. But Jinnah showed more interest about Junagarh and missed the opportunity. All these are history now.

The ground reality is Kashmir remains divided, people keep on suffering, death toll of soldiers rise by the passage of every day, and most importantly both India and Pakistan keep on bleeding economically - unrelentingly.

Practically the war will be never ending unless the leadership of Pakistan acknowledges the realities. If more important states like Bengal and Punjab could be divided during partition, why not the tiny and less important Kashmir, which practically remains divided since 1948.

Both the countries should accept the realities of the futile state of war and legalise the present line of control as border with some special considerations for the 'Kashmiris' on both sides and end the confrontation. This will allow the majority Kashmiri people to rest and live in peace and work without fear and interruption.

Why the rest forty seven thousand five hundred Hajjis are going under private management?

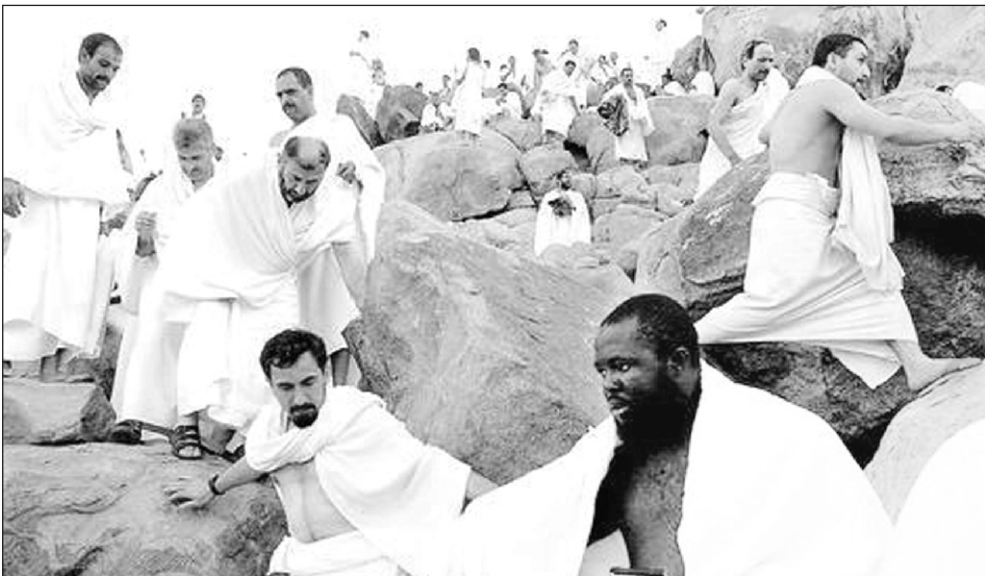
Much has been said about the major irregularities of the so called Hajj mission sent from Bangladesh to look after the Bangladeshi Hajjis in Saudi

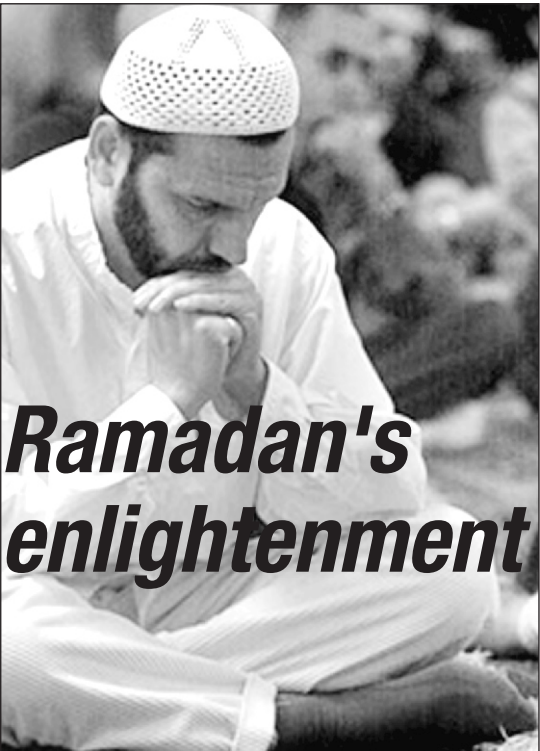
