Safi, an accused in several cases inlcuding some for murder is on the run for long. He had returned home on the previous night.

Police was quizzing him when the report was filed yesterday evening.

Gaibandha farmers see hard days ahead

Cash crops aman and banana completely damaged in six out of seven upazilas

Marginal farmer Abdur Rashid of Khalshai village in Gobindagnaj was clearing the dry and damaged Aman plants from his lands for use as fodder.

Pale and worried Rashid does not know how he will maintain his family for at least six months.

If IRRI is sown in the coming season, it will take at least six months from now to harvest it. "Right now, I have nothing to

eat", he told this correspondent during a visit to the village after the Eid.

Rashid had cultivated Aman on his $two\,and\,a\,half bigha\,land.\,He\,said\,he\,could$ not take home even five kilograms of paddy as the latest onslaught of flood completely damaged the crop.

Similar is the situation with about 44,000 peasant families including 33,776 marginal farmers in six out of upazilas in Gaibandha district.

The Agriculture Extension

Department (AED) estimates the crop loss at 41,650 tonnes worth over Tk 60 The flood in the first half of last month

Mohiuddin, Ariful Islam, Rajib, Lal Mia, Waliullah, Jahed, Annas, Shakib, Reaz, Shahidullah, Masud and Ajahar. They should be acquitted as their identity could not be ascertained from statements given by Obaidullah during interroga-



10 kg sweet potato!

Believe it or not, a sweet potato weighs 8 to 10 kilograms.

Local industrialist Kamal Ahmed brought this amazing vegetable from Australia last year and cultivated in his land in Ashuganj.

As this became known, farmers are now scrambling to collect the stem of $the \, vegetable \, for \, cultivation \, this \, winter.$ They said this will open a new dimension in potato cultivation in the country.

It grows well in the soil here. Kamal said he cultivated this potato variety on three bighas of land at his Shuhagpur village in Ashuganj and got an yield of about 250 maunds. The yield was less as he sparsely sowed the stems. The yield will be at least double if grown in a planned way, he said.

far away places to see the filed. Some of the bigger size potatoes were around 11 kilograms.

It does not need any special care. It can be grown in the way farmers cultivate our local varieties of sweet potato, he said. The alluvial soil of Ashuganj has proved suitable for this crop, he said. A farmer can easily get an yield at least 15 times they get

from local varieties, Kamal said.

Farmer Md Parves Khan said he took some stems from Kamal last year and planted those in his lands. He also got a good production.

While visiting Kasmal's house recently, this correspondent saw the giant potatoes harvested last year and stored in a room started growing stems. The stems were being processed for plantation this year.

At first farmers ignored when I Kamal has also some other high planted the steps. But as harvesting yielding varieties of mango, jambura time approached, they could not (citrus) and banana, which he pans to believe it. Scores of people caame from growin large scale.
