Gunmen for SC, HC judges Lower court judges ignored as police unable to provide them with 24-hour security

The government yesterday provided gunmen for the Supreme Court (SC) and High Court (HC) judges and tightened security at the Dhaka courts after two Jhalakathi judges were assassinated in a suicide bomb attack on Monday.

The authorities, however, did not take any steps to ensure security of the lower court judges who asked for security after the brutal killing. The police department has admitted its inability to provide gunmen for all the judges at this moment.

Bangladesh Judicial Service

Association (BJSA), an organisation of judges, leaders yesterday met Chief Justice Sved JR Mudassir Husain and requested him to take steps for tightening security for all the judges across

the country The BJSA leaders said judges in the country are now under threat and unable to conduct the court proceedings fearing bomb attacks, sources

Some 77 gunmen were provided to five judges of the Appellate Division and 71 judges of the HC Division and the SC Registrar. The chief justice already has state security.

No initiatives have been taken to ensure the security of the lower court judges, who are the main target of the attackers, the BJSA alleged.

The inspector general (IG) of police yesterday after a home ministry meeting told the press that his department cannot provide security for all the judges round the clock. Police can give protection to the judges during their movement only, he added.

"District judges have been provided with gunmen," the IG said. "Police will patrol the areas where they [judges] reside and give protection to them during their movement."

"The district administration will build up a system for their security," the IG said

The BJSA leaders, however, said the government after the August 17 and October 3 bomb blasts across the country targeting courts and other establishments, announced to provide the district judges with gunmen, but all the district judges are yet to get such security.

After the killing of two judges, the BJSA on Monday gave a seven-day ultimatum to the government to ensure security for judges and pay Tk 50 lakh as compensation to

"You never know when I'd be attacked by the assailants," Finance Minister M Saifur Rahman vesterday told journalists at his office, expressing his feeling of insecurity "You (journalists) always come to

me and ask questions standing beside my car. If I'm attacked, you will also die." Saifur said, voicing concern over the bomb culture. Emphasising collective efforts of all

Donors react to govt's plea at PRS Forum

Donors yesterday told the government if it fails to eliminate corruption and violence, and to bring transparency in governance and improve it, it would be difficult for them to continue assisting Bangladesh.

The donors made it clear on the opening day of the three-day Poverty Reduction Strategy (PRS) Forum in the city in response to the government's request for enhanced support from them.

"If over the next 15 months opportunities are held hostage by hartals

Hunt on to net JMB Blast probes stuck as top suicide bombers

In the wake of Monday's bomb attack in Jhalakathi that killed two judges, the law enforcers including intelligence officials are carrying out a countrywide hunt for members of the suicide squad of outlawed Islamist outfit Jama'atul Mujahideen Bangladesh (JMB), said a top police official.

Lists of suicide squad members of the militant organisation, prepared by the Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) intelligence, have been distributed among law enforcers across the country to crack down on them. Earlier, newspapers reported that

the banned JMB and Jagrata Muslim

Janata Bangladesh (JMJB) have formed suicide squads comprising 'Ehsar' (who sacrifices his life).

JULFIKAR ALI MANIK The law enforcers failed to prevent the tragic incident although press reports, quoting JMB sources, had already said the suicidal squads will make orchestrated attacks to avoid arrest.

Meanwhile, State Minister for Home Luthfozzaman Babar at a meeting with top officials of police, Rab, intelligence agencies and BDR vesterday discussed the next course of action against the militants. The bomb attack in Ihalakathi





Visiting UK Minister of State for Foreign and Commonwealth Affairs Kim Howells MP yesterday said the British government wants to work together with Bangladesh to combat terrorism.

Emerging from a meeting with Foreign Minister M Morshed Khan, the British minister told the diplomatic correspondents that "killing of two judges in Bangladesh by terrorists is certainly a big signal for all of us and we must think it deeply and work relentlessly to defeat the terrorists."

Replying to a question, he said the British government has been assisting Bangladesh police and will further provide skills development and efficiency enhancement training so that $police here \, can \, tackle \, the \, terrorists.$

When asked whether the Bangladeshi government failed to contain the terrorists, Kim Howells said, "I don't think the government has failed because terrorism is now a trend and many countries of the world came under terrorist attacks. SEE PAGE 15 COL 1
