Duta condemns killing of judges

Dhaka University Teachers' Association (DUTA) yesterday brought out a silent procession on the campus condemning the murder of two judges in Jhalakathi and demanded exemplary punishment to the criminals.

The procession started at the Aparajeo Bangla and ended at the Central Shaheed Minar.

DUTA Secretary Prof Dr Md Akhtaruzzaman said although militant activities are going on unabated and the progressive and creative elements are being attacked throughout the country, the government is indifferent to it. Without government's backing such $attacks\,cannot\,be\,carried\,out."\,he\,added.$

DUTA President Prof AMS Arefin Siddique said, "Rule of terrorism, not the rule of law, is prevailing in the country". Terming the slain judges 'soldier of justice', he said defying all the threats progressive section of the society will stand against all sorts of unjust activities.

The condition of a newly born girl who survived miraculously after being buried in a sand field has improved following her treatment at Dhaka Medial College Hospital

People rescued the baby smeared with blood and covered in a polythene sheet from the sand field near Hazaribagh-Boubazar in the city on November 17 and rushed her to the hospital where the doctors performed surgery on the two-day-old baby immediately.

Half of the baby's right chin and lower part of the left leg were eaten up by preving crows.

'Improve literacy programme for poverty cut'

Unesco Representative in Bangladesh Dr Wolfgang Vollmann said that improvement of literacy and Non-Formal Education (NFE) programme is a must for poverty alleviation $among \, the \, Saarc \, countries.$

He was speaking as chief guest at the inaugural session of a six-day subregional workshop for training of trainers for building up national capacity on Supervision, Monitoring and Evaluation of NFE programmes as a Means to Poverty Alleviation organised by Dhaka Ahsania Mission.

He reminded that United Nations had already announced a literacy decade (2003-2012) to boost up the NFE programme.

He said it is the responsibility of the civil society to persuade the government to take initiative for further effective NFE programme.

Former Unesco representative in Bangladesh Dr Ansar Ali said NFE and formal education was going hand in hand in many countries like Thailand, Malaysia and Indonesia, but it has not been followed in our countries.

President of Dhaka Ahsania Mission Kazi Rafiqul Alam presided.

Twenty participants from Bangladesh, India, Pakistan, Nepal and Bhutan are attending the workshop, which will continue until November 24.

C'wealth Youth Forum in full swing

Unemployment, crime and conflict, and HIV/Aids are some of the key issues being discussed at the Commonwealth Youth Forum (CYF), which began in Malta on November 16.

The forum was inaugurated by Dr Lawrence Gonzi, prime minister of Malta, with remarks by Commonwealth Deputy Secretary General Florence Mugasha, according to a news received from Commonwealth Secretariat yesterday.

The CYF, which will run up to November 23, brought together more than 100 young people from across the Commonwealth countries. This event is organised by the Commonwealth Youth Programme, the Commonwealth Youth Exchange Council, the National Youth Council of Malta and the Ministry of Education, Youth and Employment of Malta.

Andrew Simmons, deputy director of the Youth Affairs Division of the Commonwealth Secretariat, said the CYF would discuss strategies to address challenges faced by young

"There will be special workshops on areas such as project management and development, especially in the area of enterprise development for young people. We will be discussing training opportunities and offering them avenues to access these programmes to develop sustainable livelihoods.'

"We are also looking to develop the Ambassadors for Positive Living programme of peer counselling and raising awareness about HIV/Aids. We would like to get more young people involved at the national level to deal with this issue," said Simmons.

The CYF participants will also share their views on health and sexuality, Commonwealth values and principles, good governance and active citizenship, sustainable livelihoods and information and communications
