# Key JMB den busted

Hit-list, bomb materials, phone number of 50 cops, clippings on Humayun Azad killing attempt found in Rangpur hideout; 2 more judges threatened with death

The police Tuesday busted the Rangpur den of arrested Jama'atul Mujahideen Bangladesh (JMB) kingpin Abdul Awal and recovered bomb-making materials, combat training books and equipment, a list of future attack targets and cellphone numbers of some 50

A joint team of Nilphamari and Rangpur police and Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) launched the overnight raid on the second-floor den in a three-storey house at Noorpur under Mohadevpur upazila at 10:00pm. However, no arrest was made during the raid.

The law enforcement agencies suspect Awal, son-in-law of JMB chief Shaikh Abdur Rahman and third top gun of the banned Islamist outfit, was stationed in Rangpur to carry out bomb strikes on local judges, journalists and pro-liberation political leaders. He was arrested on November 18.

Also on Tuesday, JMB operatives sent letters to two more judges in Munshiganj, threatening to kill them and their families. RECOVERIES FROM

IMB DEN Our Rangpur correspondent reports: Among the materials recovered from Awal's lair were a JMB hit-list, letters from detained JMB men, laminated newspaper clippings on the assassination attempt on Humayun Azad and news clippings on various militant

The police seized a number of books on Jihad or Islamic holy war,

graphs of three unknown militants. A letter of Abdur Rahman addressed to Awal was also recovered from the floor. In it Abdur Rahman informed his son-in-law that he was safe and asked his followers to fight against all odds Islamic rule in the country. Among the explosive materials,

the police recovered one kilogram of gunpowder, a large number of detonators and splinters, timers, circuit diagrams, capacitors and a switch. Besides, two walky-talkies. 25 flashlights, cellphones, a computer, swords, one 6-volt lead-acid and 50 dry cell batteries, a radio frequency signal detector, a bombmaking dice, video footages of Afghan war and manuals on various devices were also recovered.

The police said it appears from the chequebooks that the Islamist outfit has recently withdrawn some Tk 9,00,000 from three accounts with two banks--Al Arafa Islami Bank, Dhaka and Bogra Bazar Branch of Sonali Bank.

## High-ups want to go tough on the press

Suggest adding punitive provision to Press Council Act, says council report

The president, prime minister and information minister have expressed their willingness to amend the provision of the Press Council Act related to the power to warn, admonish and censure the press, said chairman of the press

"I am in favour of adding a punitive provision to the act to make it effective and to strengthen the council," Justice Abu Sayeed

Ahammed, chairman of the council, said in the council's annual report 2004 placed in parliament vesterday.

Justice Ahammed, who was appointed the chairman of Bangladesh Press Council on May 26 this year, said amending the law is an urgent matter.

"I discussed the issue with the president, prime minister and information minister. They expressed their willingness to amend the provision," the chair-

Justice Ahammed also said the Press Council Act 1974 should also have some "executive force" so that the council can force any one to comply with the law and ensure punishment to the law violators.

The press council report's was placed yesterday amid the ruling alliance lawmakers' blistering attack on the media and demand for the enactment of tough laws to punish journalists for what they

## PM urges people to help nab militants

Warns against killing people in the name of Islam

Prime Minister Khaleda Zia has urged people to help catch the militants who are manufacturing bombs and killing people in the name of Islam.

'Don't give them shelter...One can't become martyr and cannot go to heaven by killing people," she told a public meeting at Hafiz Ibrahim College ground at Borhanuddinin Bhola yesterday.

The prime minister held the Islamist militants responsible for

## IMF for another fuel, gas, power price hike

Govt may act on the line if essentials' prices come down

International Monetary Fund (IMF) yesterday asked the government to go for another round of price hike in fuel, gas, electricity and fertiliser to ease an increasing pressure on the budget and foreign exchange reserve.

A visiting IMF mission led by its Adviser Thomas Rumbaugh conveyed the prescription to Finance Minister M Saifur Rahman at a wrap-up meeting on a \$75 million fifth instalment of Poverty Reduction Growth Facility (PRGF) and a \$25 million second tranche of

After the meeting, Saifur told the press, "I told them we have but recently raised their prices. So, right now it's not possible to increase the prices of all these items at a time.

He said, "I informed the IMF team that the rice harvesting is now on. Winter vegetables are also coming to the market. If these result in a downward trend in the price level [of essentials], then we may consider adjusting the prices of these items."




