BNP sacks Hena for anti-militant talk

Industry sources blamed the government's indifference and foot-dragging in implementing the measures demanded by business associations and those recom-mended by the National Coordination Council (NCC) formed to offset post-MFA hazards for the slowing down of woven garments export growth. The measures include setting up central bonded warehouses (CBWs) for the apparel industries in export promotion zones (EPZs), endorsing the Saarc cumulation offered by the European Union and creating a special fund for the textile indus-

Bangladesh has been lagging far behind its biggest rival China in exporting apparels to the US and EU markets since MFA termination, observed Centre for Policy Dialogue Research Director Prof Mustafizur Rahman.

EPB sources, too, said, in the face of an aggressive market expansion drive by China, Bangladesh failed to boost its apparel export to the EU countries substantially.

If the government had accepted and implemented the recommendations of the NCC, it would reduce our lead-time and thus improve our market competitiveness, remarked Bangladesh Garment Manufacturers and Exporters Association President Tipu Munshi yesterday.

IMF for further belt-tightening

Wants speedy privatisation of Rupali Bank, tax reforms

International Monetary Fund (IMF) yesterday asked the government to further tighten its monetary policy, limit non-concessional borrowing and reduce public expenditure in order to ease inflation and the pressure on foreign exchange reserve.

The IMF found the implementation of key structural reforms slow and uneven, and asked the government to expedite trade liberalisation and the reforms in

tax administration and national ised commercial banks (NCBs) to improve the country's growth prospect. In this regard he underscored a speedy privatisation of Rupali Bank as well as restructuring and eventual divestment of other NCBs.

"Despite' some tightening in monetary policy, high money and credit growth continue and are contributing to inflationary pressures," IMF Asia and Pacific Department Adviser Thomas SEE PAGE 19 COL 1

Sporadic clashes mark 14-party hartal

50 injured in Dhaka, Netrakona

Opposition activists clashed with police in riot gear in the capital yesterday during the 14-party sponsored dawn-to-dusk hartal leaving at least 30 people, including an Awami League (AL) lawmaker and two photojournalists,

The series of clashes between the hartal supporters and the police took place in front of the AL central office, Gulistan, Dainik Bangla intersection and Lalbagh in

Dhaka. Besides, the police clubbed AL processions in Netrakona, injuring some 20 people.

The opposition activists locked in a clash with the police when the law enforcers barred them from taking out a procession from the AL central office on Bangabandhu Avenue at noon.


