FM says at C'wealth meet UNB, Malta

Foreign Minister M Morshed Khan, at the Commonwealth foreign ministers meeting, reiterated Dhaka's position against terrorism in all forms and manifestations and called for addressing the root causes of terrorism.

The Bangladesh delegation emphasised on dialogue and understanding among the Commonwealth countries to improve the quality of life and minimise the socio-economic disparities to combat terrorism.

The Bangladesh delegation also made a number of interventions on different issues including Information and Communications Technology (ICT), trade, natural disaster and terrorism at the two-day foreign ministers' meeting ending on November 24.

Discussions were largely focused on achieving closer cooperation on fighting terror, and with World Trade Organisation (WTO) talks looming in Hong Kong next month, "trade and where does the Doha Development round leave us."


that liberalisation of markets should be achieved gradually.
