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Cable TV viewers are still missing pay channels

As the tug of war between two local distributors of pay channels is still going on, the cable TV viewers in most parts of the city have been missing the popular pay channels for the last two months. But the operators have not reduced the monthly line

The agents--MGH Group and Nationwide Communications Limited -- locked in the dispute in early October following arrest of several cable TV operators in connection with a case filed with Tejgaon Police Station.

The subscribers and the Cable Operators Association of Bangladesh (Coab) want an immediate solution to the dispute but the two agents stick to their stances and seem to have no headache about the subscribers' demand.

The viewers are deprived of the channels including Star Plus, Star Movies, Star News, Star World, National Geography, The History Channel and Sky News

distributed by MGH Group and Sony, Zee TV, Zee Cinema, Alpha Bangla, Discovery, AXN, Star Sports, Ten Sports and ESPN distributed by Nationwide Communications Limited.

The subscribers have to pay the full line rent for cable TV connection although the operators have refrained from providing the popular channels.

"We are missing many channels for the last few weeks. We cannot watch our favourite programmes on these channels. Still, the operators are not decreasing the line rent," said Pavel Rahman, a subscribers of

The officials of Star TV Network and Total Sports (ESPN) visited Dhaka recently but they failed to resolve the crisis.

An operator in Paltan area on condition of anonymity said: "We are in deep trouble. The problem began on October 3, when police arrested a few cable operators. We and the viewers are the victims of the dispute which is still unresolved.

M Nazrul Islam, a director of Dhaka East Cable Vision (DECV), said, "Both the groups (MGH and Nationwide) are forcing us to take a side and subscribe the pay channel package they offer. But we choose the package considering the subscribers' demand."

"In my locality sports channels have a great demand. That is why we are operating the pay channels distributed by the Nationwide Communications. And being forced by the distributor, we are not operating any channels of Star TV Network," he

Asked why they are not reduc-ing the line rent, Nazrul said, "As soon as the problem is solved, we will operate all the pay channels. I agree that the viewers are the losers, but we are also. We cannot do a business with loss.'

SM Anwar Parvez, president of Coab said, "If the problem continues, we will give an announcement of reducing line rent. But still we hope we will be able to operate all the pay channels. We want an immediate

50 years of Bangla Academy

The Bangla Academy, that emerged from the spirit of the strenous struggle of the Language Movement to establish Bangla as the mother tongue will celebrate its Golden Jubilee (1955-2005) with a three-day festival from December 3 to 5.

The authorities of the academy said that till January 2005, more than 4,410 texts, reference books and magazines had been published.

The national academy devotes itself to the development of language, literature and cul-

"We have done intensive research on folklore, language, literature, culture and issues relating to Bangla," said Murshid Anwar, assistant director, department of co-ordination and pub-

lic relations, Bangla Academy. But to expand our work we need a lot of aid and support from both the state and private organisations," he added.

He further said joint collaborations between the academy and foreign and local agencies and organisations will portray the academy's operations globally, giving it due recognition.

One official said that seminars, symposiums, workshops with language researchers should be held. Guests to the Academy demanded the collection of information from memories of eminent personalities and produce documentaries and audiovisual programmes. These programmes, he said, will help the new generation to understand the origin of such an academy.


Another said that students of local universities should collaborate with research carried on giving them an opportunity to learn many things left unsaid. "We brought the academy as

far as 50 years, but we want to take it further," added Murshid

Academy sources said that extbooks not been updated/revised in a long time.

Selina Hossain, ex-director of the Academy and an eminent writer said that over the past 50 years the institution contributed much to the research of Bangla Language. The dictionary, popularly known as the Bangla Obhidan was one of the most mentionable outcomes.

She also mentioned Folklore, the series of books on 101 subranged from Bangla to English jects; events like the Ekushey Boi Mela, the biggest congregations of writers, readers, publishers and anyone and everyone involved with books from across the country as the academy's The Bangla Academy had

been of immense support to many eminent personalities. The library is rich with 500 rare manuscripts and old newspapers and magazines, which are part of the library's gigantic collection. This collection of material now contributes much to research conducted by the Academy, said Hossain.

When asked about the ongoing crisis and irregularity in updating the textbooks published by the Academy, the exdirector said: "There is certainly a shortage of funds. But if the money sold from books especially at fairs and other times is

utilised, the problem could be minimised.

When asked why there was a shortage of printed material, Dr Abul Kalam Manzur Morshed director general (DG) of the Academy said: "A large quantity of the dictionaries were bought by Unicef and therefore the shortage.'

"We have however, made arrangements to fill the void and a huge volume is being printed and will be in the market very soon," Dr Abul Kalam said.

About the future? 'The Academy intends to bring out updated versions of the olloquial dictionary compiled by Dr Mohammed Shahidullah and anticipates the arrival of a new science dictionary in

Bangla," said the DG. He also said that Dhan Shalik er Deshey, a popular children's

magazine which had been stopped will be out soon once again along with Chirayoto Kishore Shahitto, which are translations of famous foreign Abul Kalam added that, if the

academy had financial support from the government, it hopes to bring out a dictionary for the tribal people, whose language and culture plays a large part in the Bangla culture and heritage. About the jubilee celebra-

tions, he shared the same views as Selina Hossain on the achievements made along the way.

The three-day festival has been organised to mark the 50th anniversary and will constitute speeches, cultural programmes and discussion sessions on December 4 and 5 on the achievements and expectations of the Academy.
